THE FARMERS' INSTITUTE

should be slow cooking. Dry heat tended to harden the tissue and fibrous cups, while they were dissolved by moist heat. A round steak seared on one side and turned over and cooked with a hot fire on the other side, became very tough, because all the fibre was hardened. The advisable way is to cook slowly, then slightly on the other, covering, adding water and allowing to cook slowly. A roast from the sirloin did not need so much cooking as from other parts. It should be seared over the outside with hot fire and then cooked slowly. Pot roast should be seared on all sides over an onion and water added and cooked slowly, practically steaming.

For curing pork she gave directions of a successful curing. While warm take out ribs and backbone, cut into 6 pieces, hams, shoulders and bacon sides. Sprinkle with salt or put in a weak brine a day or two draw out any blood. Cut thick piece of bacon, and cook by itself. One lb. sugar, 4 lbs. salt, by 50c saltpetre to 100 lbs. pork. Rub every day or two. A 20 lb. ham will be cured in 30 days.

How long should oatmeal or rolled oats be cooked was next discussed. Miss Maddock said 3 cups of water should be taken to one of oatmeal and with salt put in a double boiler and cooked all day. If put on the stove the next morning when fire is lit it will be ready when the other parts of breakfast are. If cooked only an hour it is sticky or clammy because the starch cells have not been properly swollen. She preferred it cooked only 20 or 30 minutes on hot fire than in this way.

There was nothing better for food than bread and butter. In summer rice and vegetables should be used. Three-fourths of the body was water. We should drink more water than we did, some said ten or twelve glasses a day. A child should always have a drink of water first thing in the morning, and last thing before going to bed. The water was necessary for the building up of tissue. It was a mistake to suppose people of sedentary habits should eat more cereals and vegetables than those of active habits, but the former should eat meats easily digested. Lean pork took 5 hours to digest, beef 3 hours.

Children who had badly cooked oatmeal for breakfast, blackened toast and fried ham and eggs, were not in the condition to study. Their brain centres were weakened because the blood was drawn away. Well cooked oatmeal, nicely crisped toast and poached eggs were good foods for children's breakfasts. One of the best aids to digestion was pure air, and children should not be taken to sleep in a room not ventilated after supper.

CITY V. COUNTRY LIFE.

Mr. J. G. Clark was the last speaker, his subject, "City versus Country Life." He had lived most of his life in the country near the city, and had opportunity to see into city life through delivering milk. People in good positions in the city often had difficulty to meet their milk bills. If a farmer would set a value on the things he has, his house, his fresh meats, his fruits, etc., he would realize how much better off he was than many in a city on a salary of \$800 or \$1,000. Some farmers cheated themselves out of the good things and sold them in the town. This was enough to make boys wish to leave the farm. Farmers do not always appreciate the surrounding beauties. When visitors come from the city the farmer should have his place tidied up to show he had as good a home as they. Contentment and love of the beautiful were needed on the farm. Nature study should be encouraged. He had known boys to leave the farm for the city, who, if they had to do in the city, would be better off. Girls in the country left home and found they had made a mistake. Women in the country have too much to do because their girls go to the city. He knew of girls from the country getting only \$3 a week in the city and having to pay for their board. If the girls in the country would set about making things bright about home it would lessen the drift to the city. It was a good thing that some men went from the country to the city. Eighty per cent of the leading men in the cities of the United States, Mr. Clark concluded by reciting as an illustration of contentment on the farm, Dr. Drummond's "Habitant."

Mayor Freeman moved a vote of thanks to the speaker. He was very much interested in the address. He pitied the boy who was not brought up on the farm, as he was himself. He was sorry he had not put his own boy on the farm from a time to build him up. In all the addresses some good points were brought out, but the lady especially pleased him. Admitting that the city was a very important thing, she was shutting herself out of their houses instead of allowing it to enter. She often wished to take a drink of water from the city, but the lady was very wise and said she would give her water and some of the well

In Lindsay were scandalous. He had to go to the hospital. He hoped when the waterworks by-law was submitted it would be carried so that we might get water that we would not be afraid to drink. Mr. E. H. Hopkins seconded the motion which was carried, and the meeting dispersed after singing the National Anthem.
