### Town Council has Already Expended Appropriations—Waterworks Improvement By-Law Will Be Submitted at Municipal Elections

The Town Council held its regular meeting on Monday evening, in the Town Clerk's office, the change from the Council Chamber being made on account of the extreme cold.

Present, Mayor Vrooman, Ald. Eyres, O'Reilly, Fisher, Begg and Mauder.

After hearing Mr. Jas. Boxall, permission was granted to Mr. R. Neill, on motion of Ald. O'Reilly and Ald. Fisher, to erect in rear of his store a storage building for empty cases, covered with corrugated iron, subject to the usual conditions.

Communications. A number of communications were read and filed. Others were disposed of as follows:

From Mrs. Mary Hand, regarding remission of her taxes.—Finance Committee.

From John Duke, resigning office of Fence Viewer.—Accepted.

From G. H. Robinson, asking remission of business tax of \$7 as he is not liable.—Granted.

Accounts were referred to the proper committees.

**POULTRYMEN ASK GRANT.**  
 A deputation from the County of Victoria Poultry and Pet-Stock Association composed of Johnston Ellis, President; George Jordan, Treasurer; Secretary Frost, Messrs. J. A. Williamson, D. C. Trew, Geo. Calvert, J. P. Ryley, Wilber Hunter and several others waited on the Council to ask for a grant.

Messrs. Ellis, Jordan, Trew and Thos. Connolly were the speakers, and strongly urged a grant on the ground of success of the first show and the educational value of such an exhibition.

Ald. O'Reilly and Fisher moved that a grant of \$60 be made, backed by a guarantee of \$50. Ald. O'Reilly, in support of the motion, pointed out that Lindsay would be on a par with five shows, thus securing the exhibition of the best birds here.

Mayor Vrooman was in sympathy with the aims of the Association, but did not see how a grant could be made as the Council was going out with a deficit. A grant had been made for the first show, and he thought the Town Council of next year might be trusted as well as the County Council.

Aldermen Begg and Rea agreed with Mayor Vrooman.

Ald. O'Reilly held out for a grant as the money would not be paid till New Year's and there was still \$100 to the good under the head of deputation expenses.

Ald. Eyres was personally in favor of a grant, and would vote for it if it were not that the year was being closed with a deficit.

The deputation then expressed willingness to wait and depend on the new Council.

Mr. G. H. Lindsay was allowed \$50 for plans of sewers laid by him during the past season.

Market Clerk Callaghan's report for November showed weighing fees, \$67.50; tolls, \$10.40; total \$77.90.

The report of Mrs. E. E. Sharpe, Trust Officer, was referred to the Police and Lighting Committee.

The reports of the various committees, already published, were adopted.

By-law No. 1105 was passed amending a clause in the market by-law which prevented a butcher bringing meat on the market in less quantities than a quarter. The amendment provides that where a quarter has already been cut on the market and a portion of it unsold the remaining portion may be brought on the market again, if soured and wholesome and is not less than 10 lbs. in weight.

By-law No. 1106 provides for the holding of municipal elections. The nomination of Mayor, Reeve, Deputy-reeve, Aldermen, will be held at the Town Hall Dec. 31st, at 7:30 p.m., and a poll will be opened (if necessary) on Monday, Jan. 7th.

The following are the polling places and deputy-returning officers: East Ward—No. 1, Grozell's shoe shop, Fremont Crandell; No. 2, Crandell's office, J. O'Reilly, South Ward—No. 1, Lindsay Bros.' office, W. J. Stewart; No. 2, Jewett's Livery office, A. A. J. Soames; No. 3, Tanager's office, Lindsay; G. C. Buck, North Ward—No. 1, Market room, John Kelley; No. 2, Skitch's carriage shop, A. Palen; No. 3, Horn Bros. office, John Smith.

By-law 1107 authorizes settlement with Samuel Walker of suit in High Court for damages by flooding cellar.

These were all passed. The Waterworks Improvement by-law received a first and second reading. It provides for the raising of \$20,000 at 4 per cent interest for new filtration system. The loan is for 20 years, and will require an annual payment of \$1537.53 to meet principal and interest. It will be voted on at the municipal elections, and is published in this issue of the Watchman-Warder.

### OBITUARY

#### ALEXANDER O'NEILL.

The death of Mr. Alexander O'Neill, third son of Mr. Patrick O'Neill, street commissioner, Lindsay, took place on Saturday morning last near Orillia, under sad circumstances. Young Mr. O'Neill had been employed in the lumber woods near Sudbury. On Friday his father received a telegram from the hospital authorities at Sudbury stating that his son had been badly frozen, and was in a serious condition. Mr. O'Neill left as soon as possible for Sudbury, and started home by next train with his son, but the young man expired near Orillia. It is not known exactly how the accident leading to the death occurred, but it is supposed the young man lost his way in the woods in going from one shanty to another. The funeral took place on Monday to the R. C. cemetery. Much sympathy is felt for his father and other relatives.

#### MISS HATTIE MASSAW.

Miss Hattie Massaw, daughter of Mr. Thomas Massaw, an old employe of the Flavelle Milling Co., died in the hospital on Thursday morning last of typhoid fever, aged 23. Much sympathy is felt for the family. This was the first death from typhoid fever in the hospital this year. Friends will be glad to know that her younger sister, who is in the hospital with the same disease is progressing favorably.

The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Jos. Bell, of the east ward, will be sorry to learn of the death of their only child, William Everett, aged 4 years and 11 months, on Saturday morning, Dec. 1st, 1906.

### THE CHANGES IN THE DOMINION TARIFF

CHIEF FEATURES OF THE PROVISIONS OF THE NEW SCHEDULES OF CUSTOMS DUTIES

The Mail and Empire thus summarize the chief provisions of the new tariff brought in by Mr. Fielding on Thursday of last week, and which at once became effective:

British preference changed by abolition of the 33-1/3 per cent discount on British goods and substitution thereof of a special discount for each article. In some cases preference is increased, in others it is lessened.

A new schedule of duties introduced as basis of negotiations with other countries. Countries agreeing to the terms, enjoy a rate of duty in Canada half way between the tariff proper and the British preference.

Surtax on German goods continued. Clause authorizing the Government to reduce duty on articles in which there is a combine altered so as to provide that when any court finds persons guilty of combining, the Government may take action.

Duties slightly reduced on reapers, mowers, binders, scythes, axes, confectionery, cardboard and gasoline, oranges and lemons.

Duties increased on silverware, jewelry, clocks, watches, linotypes, telephone instruments, hats and caps, neckties, collars and cuffs, brushes, gaiters, perfumery, brick bats, canned meats, horses, cattle, beans, peas and vegetables.

### District Notes

—Orillia raised \$25,000 by debentures this year to build cement sidewalks, of which \$24,144 has been expended, leaving \$855.88 to complete work undertaken in the spring.

—The estimates which were brought down in the House of Commons on Friday contain an appropriation of \$33,500 for improvements to the Trent Canal; \$35,000 for new concrete dam at Buckhorn; \$10,000 for new concrete at Lovesick, Burleigh Falls, and \$15,000 for a new boat for towing and inspection on the canal.

—Six and one-third miles of permanent sidewalks were laid in Peterborough, a mile and a third more than in any previous year.

—The maintenance of the inmates of Peterborough County House of Refuge will be paid by each municipality at the rate of 50 cents per head per week.

—The salary of City Clerk Armstrong, of Peterborough, has been advanced from \$1,250 to \$2,000, he to pay all assistants.
