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#### Suggestions to Teachers

The boys and girls of the present generation have not, it can scarcely be denied, as good deportment, as past generations had, and are especially lacking in deference to older people. This is stated as a broad truth without reference to any particular locality. There is a disposition to place the blame on the teachers of to-day, but it cannot be justly charged in any great degree against the instructors of youth in the school. It lies deeper than that. Parents themselves are largely guilty of the deterioration in regard to this important matter. They do not, in many cases, demand of their children that respect which was demanded by the parents of a generation ago. Too often the children rule the parents instead of the parents ruling the children. This reverses both the Divine and natural law on the subject. The teachers under present day conditions have a hard proposition to contend with. They can, however, do something to overcome the spirit of lack of respect towards elders. Mr. P. H. Bowyer, M.P.P., for East Kent, one of the brightest and brainiest country newspaper editors in Ontario, makes some sensible remarks in a recent issue of his paper, the Ridgeway Dominion. They are worthy of note, and in quoting them there is no intention of implying that there is a special need of them in Lindsay or in this district, as the writer is not familiar enough with the conditions to speak with authority. They are quoted as being capable of general application. These are the Dominion's words:

We believe that every Friday afternoon from 3.30 to 4 o'clock the teacher cannot be better employed in the service of the pupil, parent and state than in giving talks, inculcating a proper respect for law, order and property. The older pupils should be taught that "might is not right," and that it is unmanly for the larger boys and girls to pick on and torment in any way the smaller ones, and all should be taught to pay due deference to their elders; that they should leave the school in an orderly manner, not like a pack of animals, giving at least a portion of the sidewalk to people they chance to meet. Pupils might also be taught kindness to birds and animals, warned against crossing lawns and boulevards, and a due regard for flower beds. Boys, especially, should be taught respect for property, even though unoccupied. The danger of stone-throwing should be pointed out, the windows of vacant houses, it might be mentioned, are not proper targets for stones or snowballs, and knives should not be used in carving names or monograms on fences, gates or sidewalks.
