**Samples of Choice Grain for the Improvement of Seed**

(Continued from page 11)

Selected Leaming, Early Mastour and White Cap Yellow Dent. Potatoes—Carman No. 1, Early White Prize, Rochester Rose, Money Maker and Late Puritan.

Only one sample can be sent to each applicant, hence if an individual receives a sample of oats he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley or potatoes. Lists of names from one individual, or applications for more than one sample for one household cannot be entertained. The samples will be sent free of charge through the mail.

Applications should be addressed to the Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa, and may be sent in any time before the 15th of February, after which the lists will be closed, so that the samples asked for may be sent in good time for sowing. Applicants should mention the variety they prefer, with a second sort as an alternative. Applications will be filled in the order they are received, so long as the seed supply lasts. Farmers are advised to apply early to avoid possible disappointment. Those applying for Indian corn or potatoes will please bear in mind that the corn is not usually distributed until March, and that potatoes cannot be mailed from here until the danger from frost in transit is over. No postage is re-

quired on mail matter addressed to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

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**The Omemee Road Dispute**

Since the publication of the article in last week's Watchman-Warder in regard to anticipated litigation between the township of Ops and farmers therein over the re-opening of a portion of the Omemee road, several complaints have been made that some of the statements therein were put in such a way as to lead to a wrong conclusion as to what had actually been done prior to the initiation of legal proceedings.

The article was furnished this office from what was considered a reliable source. It is said, however, by those who object to statements therein that there is a strong desire on the part of many in the township to keep the road open, that the question was practically fought out at the municipal elections in January, and therefore the present Council is backed by public opinion in resolving to keep the road open. They also point to the anxiety of Lindsay people to have this portion of road still available as an evidence of its necessity and convenience. The Watchman-Warder has been further informed that although the farmers who received deeds from the Council of 1905 were not compensated that the present Reeve visited them and endeavored to make a settlement.
