Col. Hughes Urges Claims of Cobocok District to Extension of Trent Canal

In the House on Monday, December 3, Col. Hughes proposed a motion for the construction of a branch canal from the main waters of the Trent Canal, at the Village of Cobocok, on the height of land, Balsam Lake, northward up the Gull River waters for about 60 miles. He took it for granted that the main Trent Canal would be pressed to a speedy completion. Summarized, the arguments advanced for the construction of the work were: (1) The policy of the Government as in the canal from Lake Simcoe to Newmarket; (2) the great quantities of valuable hardwood and other timbers tributary to these lakes which could not be hauled over the rugged hills to the railway, but which could be readily brought down in scows; (3) the benefit to farmers along the route, there being about 20,000 persons tributary to the route now; (4) the opening up of large new areas for farming and grazing, for the settlers are no longer lumbermen for nine months and farmers for three. They are farmers and are all doing well; (5) incidentally it would be a great tourist route, and nearly \$2,000,000 was last year left in Muskoka alone.

He suggested that there should be a lock and dam at Cobocok, thence through Mud Turtle Lakes to Norland. A lock there and at Elliott's Falls would lead into Moor's Lake, thence via a small lift at Moor's Falls or Leary's. There would be a clear stretch through the beautiful waters of Gull Lake to Minden; and thence by a slide lock operated by water power access could be had to Mountain Lake; thence with a dam between Horseshoe and Mountain

Lakes, navigation would be open for 30 or 50 miles further on.

Inasmuch as the Government had adopted the policy of branch lines and branch railways, he thought the question worthy of consideration.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier did not comment the proposition, but suggested the advisability of reforesting the whole country and closing out the settlements. He asked Col. Hughes to withdraw the motion, as the object of furnishing the House with the data had been accomplished. He promised to look into the matter, and bring the matter before the Minister.

Mr. Bennett spoke of the importance of completing the main sections of the Trent Canal.

Col. Hughes, in reply, strongly combated the proposal to reforest that region, and gave data showing timber and splendidly adapted for grazing and farming. The motion was withdrawn.

On Wednesday Col. Hughes asked what water powers are still possessed by the Government of Canada along the route of the Trent Canal, what water powers had been leased or disposed of, and what were the terms. In each case he was informed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier that the information would be too voluminous in the form of a question, but there was no objection to granting it as a return to the House. Sir Wilfrid also replied to Col. Hughes that there was no disputed jurisdiction or disputed ownership between the Government of Canada and the Ontario in relation to any of these.

EXPERIMENTAL FARM IN NEW ONTARIO

ONTARIO GOVERNMENT WILL SHORTLY SELECT LAND IN NEWMARKET TOWNSHIP NIPISSING DISTRICT FOR EXPERIMENTAL FARM.

Toronto, Dec. 8.—Active steps are being taken by the Government in regard to the establishment of the proposed experimental farm in Northern Ontario beyond the Height of Land. It is expected that in a few days the precise location will be announced. This much has been settled, the farm will be 640 acres in extent, or one square mile. It will be situated on the line of the Temiskaming and the Northern Ontario Railway in the Township of Newmarket, in the Dis-

trict of Nipissing. Several suitable locations in that district, which is a rolling country, well drained and well timbered, and having a clay loam soil, have been recommended to the Ministry by Mr. Robt. Reid, one of the Hudson's Bay factors, who is also a land surveyor, and has been acting for the Government. From these the Government will make its choice, and it is likely that the Legislature will be asked to vote a sum of money in the early days of the approaching session for the purpose of clearing the land before the Spring. That done the buildings will be erected and the working of the farm will be commenced.

The Township of Newmarket, in which the farm will be situated, is 200 miles northwest of North Bay. It is almost directly west of Lake Abitibi, which is 35 miles to the east. It is expected that the Government railway will be built into the neighborhood very soon. Originally a site further to the south was selected by Hon. Mr. Monteth, Minister of Agriculture. Owing to the nature of the country, which would make considerable bridging necessary, the Temiskaming road along the bank of the Abitibi River had to be abandoned, and the line constructed in a westerly direction. Consequently the location selected was left at some distance from the only means of rapid communication. Between this spot and the Township of Newmarket, the territory was largely held by veterans' land grants. Hence the final choice for the farm, which will, it is hoped, do much for agriculture in the clay belt, will perforce be one of the outposts of civilization in the far northern regions of the Province.

He had also six heifers, the first year in milk, which gave an average of 5,000 lbs., and three of them gave 6,000 lbs. and one 6,500 lbs. The other two were from his two poorest cows and did not come up to his idea of what the cow should, and would be turned to the butcher next season.
