Railway Wreck on G.T.R. Near Omeme Junction

Derailment of Passenger Train Follows Breaking of an Axle on a Freight—The Passengers Escape Injury—Engineer and Fireman Injured

(Special to The Watchman-Warder.) Omeme, Dec. 10.—While the engine of the mixed train, generally known as the Britton train, was engaged in shunting at the Omeme station on Saturday morning, an axle on the tender broke, thus blocking the main line for several hours. However, through traffic was not delayed as the break occurred directly opposite the switch which in the meantime was being occupied as main line. The switch, therefore, was open at each end for the accommodation of all approaching trains from either direction. At the 11.15 a.m. express was nearing the western switch, at somewhat increased speed owing to its being a few minutes late, the engineer, Peter McCuskey, of Toronto, failed to observe in time, that his train was to take the switch. The fireman, Albert Bishop, also of Toronto, busy with some necessary task at the time, did not detect the danger soon enough, and although the brakes were applied as soon as possible, the train made the sudden transfer at too high a speed to keep the rails and in a mo-

ment not a single section of the train remained in place. The engine, the best in the service on this division, remained on the roadbed for possibly twice its length, and then turned down a steep bank to the left, tearing off its fore trucks as it buried its front in the frozen earth below. The tender, being freed from the engine ahead, continued with the rails, passed the engine, and lay broadside of the switch a few yards beyond. The mail and baggage car also passed the engine to come to a sudden standstill, derailed, considerably damaged with the trucks disarranged. The middle coach, turning more to the left, collided with the rear of the engine proper, stood motionless on the edge of the embankment with its front trucks lying in the ditch below. This car was more damaged than any of the others. The rear coach stood somewhat across the rails but was little damaged. How the occupants of the engine escaped with their lives is a mystery. The engineer was found behind the engine, under the front portion of the second coach; the fireman was thrown about 30 feet beyond the engine. The form-

or sustained a few bruises about the head, the latter, though more seriously injured, will be convalescent in a few days. There were some thirty or forty passengers on board at the time of the accident, but they all escaped quite safely, considering the danger to which they had been exposed so unexpectedly, save for the commercial traveller, who in his excited efforts to reach the outside, sustained temporary injury by jumping through one of the windows. Brakeman McCrae, who so narrowly escaped death a few months ago, at the Lindsay station, had his hand on the coach door to open it, and as the train approached the station, when the train left the rails and was wrecked. Had he been out at the time of the accident, escape from the engine would have been a mystery. It also appears strange that the station without any knowledge of the conditions which prevailed at the switch. Report has reached us that the fireman in the above wreck has since died in the Peterborough Hospital. The auxiliary train was soon on the scene removing those portions of the wreckage necessary in order to get the main line open for traffic, which was accomplished by 6 o'clock that evening. On Sunday the work of removing the coaches was begun, when all but the engine was removed. To get the engine unearthened and to the rails again will necessitate both time and labor as a special track wire will have to be laid for about 300 yards for this purpose.


