Dr. Burrows appeared before the

council and addresses them on two subjects. The first was the question of his taxes. Dr. Burrows thought that he should noti be required: to pay more than \$45 on his property. Theproperty had depreciated very much in value, and this he claimed was due to the action or lack of action of the council in allowing the the property. Dr. Burrows said 'he had repeatedly protested against the existence of the nuisance caused by the Fanning Sale Stables, and other residents of the street had protested, but the council had taken no action. Dr. Burrows asked the council to consider what was allowable in a sales stable. He read from adand kind of animals kept on the premises for the auction sales and also protested against the use of ithe street for the purposes of the sales. Horses were run up and down the street for exhibition in contravention to the Act. Dr. Burrows spoke at some length regarding the odor, the flies and the other unpleasant things caused by the proximity of the stables. He thought it was an unsanitary condition of affairs and the counil should not tolerate it. Dr. Sin son spoke along similar lines. He said his house was sometimes almost uninhabitable on account of the nuislance. His property had depreciated in value fully one third.
