Two Prisoners Made Good Their Escape From the Jail

From Monday's Daily.

The two prisoners, William Brooks and Fred Mallory, who made a successful escape from the county jail on Saturday afternoon, are still enjoying their freedom. Chief of Police Vincent spent most of Saturday afternoon scouring the neighborhood to the north of the town, in which direction the escaped jail birds were last seen, but without result.

The manner of the escape was not sensational by any means. The two prisoners simply climbed up on a board fence about ten or twelve feet high. Turnkey Andrews had three of the jail inmates, including the two who escaped, in another yard sawing wood. This is generally done in the inner jail yard, which is surrounded by a high stone wall. However, the court house was without firewood and the prisoners were sentenced to hard labor so they were placed in the outside yard, on the east of the main jail yard.

The men were sawing wood and wheeling it when they saw the woodshed. Turnkey Andrews saw Brooks and Mallory go around the corner of the woodshed faster than usual on one occasion and followed them. When he got within view of the inside yard the place was empty and he saw the heels of one of the escapees as he disappeared over the wall, into the courthouse park. The turnkey then immediately took the remaining prisoner, who happened to be Percy Nettleton, who was serving a term for stabbing, into the jail and informed Governor Jackson of the escape.

However, the wall between the two yards had been previously informed by several little fellows who witnessed the escape from the other side of the wall and Turnkey Andrews was sent in pursuit.

It seems that the escaped men had made up Collins and dropped over a cross through Licenser Inspector Thornbury's garden. Mrs. Thornbury saw them in their jail garb and telephoned down town. There is no telephone in the police court and the chief was late in being informed, and this precious time was wasted. However, he secured a rig as soon as he was informed and made a thorough search of the district north of the town and the places the es-

caped men would most likely head for.

Residents in the northern part of the town state that the two men were seen running down Albert-st. northward, and that they ran into the swamp at the end of the street, where they were lost to view. A farmer afterwards saw them going into a woods in the vicinity of the town, westerly on the Fenelon road.

Turnkey Andrews searched high and low, but was unable to find the least trace of the escaped prisoners.

Governor Jackson feels the escape of the prisoners keenly, it being the first event of that kind to take place within the past forty years.

Brooks was sentenced to eighteen months in the Central prison at hard labor for stealing a horse and rig and was awaiting his removal in the Toronto jail. Fred Mallory is a man forty-seven years of age and has served about eight months out of a two year (minus a day) sentence for stealing a fur coat from a local hotel here last winter. It is said that he has served several sentences in Central prison previously.

Governor Jackson showed a War-der reporter over the jail yards this morning, and explained the manner in which the two daring prisoners made their exit. As he showed, the escape was a simple one.

Some years ago two Richardson brothers attempted an escape from the jail in a sensational manner but were re-captured. The door opened between two yards, and they climbed up on the open door to the top of the wall between the two yards and crawled along this wall part of the outside wall. It did not take two minutes for them to escape, but they were secured again shortly afterwards.

The prisoners it is thought, have secured either clothes and doff their jail garb. Special constables are in search of them and the telegraph and telephone has spread their description abroad.

"Well, no more prisoners can escape," declared Governor Jackson this morning.

"How is that?" asked the reporter.

"There are no more in jail," was the reply.

NON-JURY HIGH COURT Sittings to Commence on Monday Next

The non-jury sittings of the High Court will commence next Monday. Chief Justice Falconbridge, of Toronto, will preside.

Just four cases at present are slated to come up for a hearing. Of these one or two are interesting. The cases are:

Sarah Cobble v. Geo. D. Fielder. This is a case in which the plaintiff charges the defendant with breaking an agreement. Hopkins & Hopkins for plaintiff; McLaughlin, Peel and Fulton for defendant.

N. L. Martin, assignee for the benefit of the creditors of Corscadden & Mullen, and Jas. B. Begg v. G. H. Hopkins. This is a very intricate one arising out of the collecting of certain debts. I. E. Weldon for plaintiff; F. Holmes Hopkins for defendant.

Christina K. McKinnon, Margaret Campbell, Sarah McLean and Mar the Spence v. John Spence, John Spence, Jr., and Margaret Spence. The plaintiffs and defendants in this case are respectable residents of Mississauga and the case arises out of the ownership of certain lands, which is in dispute. It seems that the father of the several of the disputants died many years ago and left a will which never had been legally entered. The plaintiffs claim that John Spence secured the property, and that they did not receive any share of the estate. McDiarmid & Weeks for the plaintiffs and A. J. Reid for defendants.

Two Escaped Prisoners Captured at Pefferlaw

From Tuesday's Daily.

William Brooks and Fred Mallory, who escaped from the Lindsay jail on Saturday afternoon, did not enjoy the sweet air of liberty very long. The two were captured at the village of Pefferlaw last evening by Provincial Detective Scully, according to reports. This officer is the same man who informed Chief Vincent that Brooks had passed through Pefferlaw in the latter's stolen horse some time ago. Chief Vincent left this morning to bring the prisoners home. He will be back this evening.

Pefferlaw is a little village just west of Cannington. The G.T.R. railway is not connected with it and the chief had arrangements made to drive from Blackwater there. There is no lock-up or police station at Pefferlaw.

The two jail breakers had been inquiring for work in the neighborhood, immediately after they had been apprehended. They were dressed in the jail garb, but had changed the clothing, in an ingenious way. The trousers are half yellow and half black and the men had divided the colors and in some way sewed them together again so that the re-

made trousers were of one color. Brooks wore the yellow trousers and Mallory the black one. The latter also wore a pair of overalls on the top of the jail trousers. Brooks wore a black coat he had raked up somewhere, but Mallory had his prison shirt on. The pair had evidently been roughing it for they were tired and hungry.

Few details of the arrest were given to-day, but it appears that since their escape the prisoners have been begging where they could for something to eat. They also had endeavored to get work at the homes of farmers, but were unsuccessful. Hiding in the day time in swamps or woods, the two would probably travel at night and on foot. They pursued their way out the Oakwood road, westerly, through the village of Manilla, then north westerly through Cannington and on to Pefferlaw.

The season is a bad one for jail-breaking, as the two must have experienced considerable hardship owing to the cold.

Brooks and Mallory will now have to face the serious charge of jail-breaking.

Simcoe Chief Accused of Shooting at Policeman --Five Shots in the Body

Simcoe, Ont., Dec. 1.—About one o'clock this morning Policeman Wilkins was shot while in the park. It is said five shots entered his body from a revolver and that his assailant was so close when the shots were fired that his clothing was burned.

When he regained consciousness Wilkins found his way to the office of Dr. Bowley, and was taken care of, and afterwards removed to the sanitarium. His recovery is considered very doubtful.

Acting on statements made by Policeman Wiggins, the arrest of Chief of Police Malone was effected, charged with being the assailant, and the chief is now locked up in the county goal.
