TEACHER SENTENCED

BY JUDGE FOR STRIKING LITTLE CHILDREN.

Montreal, Dec. 12.—"I cannot believe that children should be beaten. Correction does not mean physical punishment, and striking little children is nothing short of cruelty. There are laws to protect children from the cruelty of their elders, and no school teachers, no matter how bad her temper may be, should be tolerated if she ill-treats little boys or little girls."

This sums up the judgment given by Judge Bazin, when he sentenced Miss Marie Louise Michaud, a school-mistress whose treatment of the children under her charge was declared by witnesses open to severe criticism.

As the woman was poor and was taken to a sanitarium, Judge Bazin decided not to impose a jail sentence, but he fined her nominally. She was warned not to go into the teaching profession again.

TWINS ENTERED.

A fine, healthy pair of babies, twins were entered in the baby contest to be held in connection with the Christmas Fair on Tuesday, Dec. 22. The two infants were entered this morning.

A BUSY SEASON.

The men at Mr. S. J. Fox's brick-yards had a very busy season (just completed) having turned out over one thousand more brick this season than last season. In winter the yards are closed down although many carloads are still being shipped away. No brick is made at the Fox brick yards in the winter time. There is a large demand for brick and all orders were promptly attended to.

DECLARE SURPLUS.

Lindsay's water system will benefit the town to the extent of \$5,500 this year. Secretary Ray stated this morning that the surplus for 1909 will amount to this sum, anyway, and may reach \$6,000.

"If nothing eventuates necessitating large expenditures the surplus will be that sum," he said this morning.

Last year the surplus was \$4,800 so the increase will be a very satisfactory one. The commissioners have kept a careful oversight over this business, which belongs to the town and Lindsay thereby benefits to the extent of thousands of dollars yearly, while the water rate is kept at a reasonable rate.

RIDING ON FLAT CARS.
