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BY-LAW NO. 412

A BY-LAW FOR PROHIBITING THE SALE BY RETAIL OF SPIRITUOUS, FERMENTED OR OTHER MANUFACTURED LIQUORS IN THE TOWNSHIP OF BEXLEY.

WHEREAS a petition in writing signed by at least twenty-five per cent of the total number of persons appearing on the last revised Voters' List of the Municipality of the Township of Bexley, to be qualified to vote at Municipal Elections, has been filed with the clerk of the said municipality on or before the first day of November, 1910, praying for the submission of a by-law for Local Option under the provisions of the Liquor License Act and the Consolidated Municipal Act, and amendments thereto.

AND WHEREAS it is the duty of the Council of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Bexley to submit such Local Option by-law to the vote of the municipal electors, at the time fixed by statute or by-law for the annual election of members of the Council of the said municipality for the year 1911.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Bexley, enacts as follows: 1. The sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors in any tavern, inn, or other house or place of public entertainment, and the sale thereof except by wholesale in shops and places other than houses of public entertainment, is hereby prohibited within the municipality of the Township of Bexley.

2. This by-law shall come into force and take effect as from the first day of May next, after the passing thereof.

3. The votes of the electors of the said Township of Bexley shall be taken on this by-law at the same hour, on the same day, and at the same places, and by the same deputy returning officers, as for the next annual municipal election for the Municipal Council of the said Township of Bexley (that is for the year 1911).

4. On Friday, the Thirtieth day of December, 1910, the Reeve of the said township shall attend at the office of the clerk thereof, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, to appoint persons to attend at the various polling places aforesaid, and at the final summing up of the votes by the clerk, on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting or opposing the passing of this by-law respectively.

5. The clerk of the council of the said Township of Bexley shall attend at his office at eleven o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, the fourth day of January, 1911, to sum up the number of votes for and against the said by-law.

Read a first and second time, the 20th day of October, 1910. Take notice that the above is a true copy of the proposed by-law which has been taken into consideration and which will be finally passed by the Council of the Township of Bexley on the event of the assent of the electors being obtained thereto, in accordance with the provisions of Section 141, of the Liquor License Act, after one month from the first publication in The Watchman-Warder, the date of which first publication was the eighth day of December, 1910, and that the votes of the electors of the said municipality shall be taken thereon at the same hour on the same day, and at the same places, and by the same deputy-returning officers as for the municipal election for the year 1911, as provided in the said by-law.
