A Fine Catch of Muskies

—Rod and Gun.

The fishing on Lake Scugog, Ontario, was exceptionally good during the last season and maskinonge of large size were frequently caught. Mr. F. A. Linton and Mr. R. Linton of Toronto, spent their vacation at Casarsa, a fine summer resort on the lake. The place is reached after a two hours' ride from Toronto on the Canadian Pacific Railway, leaving the train at Nestleton and driving back for two miles. Good accommodation is to be had, and the scenic beauties of the place are unsurpassed elsewhere. Bass fishing is good and on several occasions during their stay the brothers caught their limit.

Destructive Carp Coming Down Canal

To those who have given the matter any degree of thought, it is quite evident that the fish commonly called carp are about to play havoc with the various lakes and rivers that comprise the Trent waterway. In so far as this district being looked upon as the sportman's paradise is concerned.

Some years ago carp were unknown to most people along the line of the Trent canal. To-day one can find this fish in any of the streams from Kirkfield to Rice Lake. Their destroying effect on other fish will soon be felt, and the various lakes and rivers adjacent to Peterboro will be seriously affected.

These carp have come down from Lake Simcoe. As to how they came to that lake in the first place, the writer does not know. It may be that they were placed there intentionally, with the idea that they were a good fish for that body of water. The fact remains, however, that with the opening of the Trent canal, from Lake Simcoe to Balsam Lake, these fish traveled over to Kirkfield, slowly but gradually got locked over the height of land and were soon down in to Balsam Lake. From Balsam Lake they have traveled on down the canal and can now be found in all of the lakes and rivers to Hastings.

The carp is a most destructive fish and is bound to kill off the lungs, bass and other fish that afford such good sport to the anglers of this district. The destructive nature of carp is not confined to the killing of fish alone. The rice beds of our lakes and rivers are beginning to suffer. In the section of the canal that stretches from Balsam Lake to Lake Simcoe, are hundreds of acres of flooded land. Some years ago the government very wisely sowed wild rice in these areas. The rice came up splendidly and the indications for a time were that the flooded-reaches below Kirkfield would prove to be a splendid duck shooting district. But the destructive nature of the carp became evident in this respect as well, and to-day there is scarcely a stalk of wild rice to be seen along this stretch. It has all been rooted out and eaten by these gluttonous fish. The frogs, too, are disappearing. One can now scarcely hear the croak of a frog between Game-bridge and Kirkfield, where a few years ago there were thousands. The Lake Simcoe-Balsam Lake section is being depleted of every living thing excepting carp.

The same destruction that has come over the other fish, the frogs and the rice above Kirkfield, will soon be in evidence between Balsam Lake and Trenton. The carp is gradually taking possession of our waters and a serious state of affairs confronts us. "Deckhand" in Peterboro Examiner.

The Village Band Not Passing Away

The village band is not becoming extinct; it has a wide, and as a matter of fact, a remunerative line of engagements open to it, and is assisted as well by substantial civic grants. But the village band, the delight of the small boy, the comfort of the various church societies, and the pride of the municipality, has to exist under much less favorable circumstances. The village band is supposed to turn out at any old time, on any old occasion, and invariably without remuneration at that. No wonder, then, that there are fewer village bands in this district than there were some years ago. The village band is, as a rule, supplied with instruments by many of the members providing their own, and the remainder being purchased by money earned by the band, which, in the case of a city organization, would go down into the pockets of the players themselves. The village band is supposed to give its services gratuitously at every Sunday school picnic, garden party, basket social, or on any hero-worshipping occasion that may arise. In addition to this, the village band is expected to reel off an up-to-date program on the village green once a week at least.
