township of Ops: For Reeve, Messrs. Peter Hawkins and James Robertson. Councillors, Messrs. W. Walden, F. W. Hickson, D. W. Terrill, Wm. Best and George Maloney. On a motion, which met with the approval of the house, Mr. John Deyell took the chair.

REEVE HAWKINS. The chairman called on Reeve Hawkins, who said in part that he was pleased to be here once more amongst his people, and to give a concise statement of what had taken place in the municipal and county council during the past year. The past year, the speaker said, had been one filled with difficulties, owing to so many cases of railway tangles which required the attention of the council to straighten out. Euton's Grove bridge was fully explained as to cost of construction and maintenance. On this \$250 was saved by the judicious work of Reeve Hawkins. The Stewart bridge with its many winds and turns was dealt with also, as was the successful manner in which the Board of Railway Commissioners had been induced to grant certain concessions to the township.

George Maloney, a new candidate, spoke in a becoming way, and looked for the hearty support of his fellow ratepayers in the coming contest. The speaker said he had no sins to answer for, and would endeavor to keep a clean record if elected.

W. F. Wilson said he would withdraw owing to poor vote cast for him last year. Mr. W. B. Fee made a capital fine speech and brought out many good points. He said he was not an aspirant for municipal honors, and thought a council should be encouraged. Do not find fault with a man after doing a good day's work, he said, and concluded by advising the ratepayers to elect the old council for the coming year.
