Up-To-Date Farmer--Fine System of Waterworks

Thorston, who farms 200 acres of land on the outskirts of the village and who has a stock of over 60 head of cattle, besides horses and other stock, has just completed his system of farm waterworks in stable and house, which is very enterprising.

From the Fenelon road, on which the farm is situated, to the house, and to the barn, is a gradual rise of ground. The ground level at the barn being about on a level with the roof of the house the pipe bringing the water into the stable for the cattle is reduced from an inch to half an inch as it leaves the stable and is conducted to the house by underground piping.
