**Lee Studio Up-to Date In Every Respect--Artistic Work**

The competent, modern and artistic artist in order to have the best results possible must have a studio in keeping. This is the case in regard to the Lee studio, of which Mr. Frank D. Lee is proprietor. Mr. F. D. Lee, who has been a resident of Lindsay for a number of years past, and who recently bought out the long-established Fowler photograph studio, is now comfortably located in the new Beall building, where he occupies one of the most modern studios in the country. Mr. Lee has long enjoyed the enviable reputation of being an artist in his vocation, and this splendid reputation has been enhanced since his location in his new studio, which was laid out according to his own plans. It is comfortable in every respect and exceedingly well equipped with the accessories essential to a modern studio. The Lee studio is located on the top storey and at the rear, where the best possible results can be obtained in lighting effect. Upon mounting the stairs and entering the studio the visitor finds himself in a small but well arranged reception room, where several fine specimens of photographic work are neatly displayed. On the wall are arranged a number of fine enlargements, nicely framed. In fact Mr. Lee makes a specialty of enlargements from photographs or snap shots. The work accomplished along this line is particularly good. The reception room, as well as the dressing room, face the operating room, although all three are neatly panelled off; the work room and dark room are also immediately adjacent to the operating room. The dressing room is well arranged and private. But it is in the operating room where one receives the best impression. At a glance even the tyro cannot fail to notice that everything has been carried out with a view to accomplishing the best results in photography. The large slanting skylight, composed of specified glass, makes a bright, cheery room; the walls have been handsomely decorated to represent a cozy drawing room; the fixtures, curtains, etc., are in keeping with the rest of the fittings, including a large window-seat effect, which is very popular, and from which many artistic, as well as realistic sittings are made possible. In keeping with the times and the ever changing ideas, Mr. Lee has turned out a number of beautiful photographs. His workmanship is of the best and visitors are always welcomed and invited to visit the studio.

**WELL-KNOWN STOCK DEALER TALKS WITH WARDER**  
Mr. Herb. Graham, cattle dealer, in speaking of the live stock industry in Canada, stated that Ontario will eventually become the breeding centre of the dominion. The western provinces will continue to produce grain as the climate in most of the provinces except Alberta, does not favor the development of beef cattle, owing to so much cold weather and the duration of the winters. Money can be made much easier in Ontario by feeding stock than grain-producing. Let the farmer, he said, set aside a portion for agriculture sufficient to produce winter fodder and keep only the number of cattle that it is possible to feed well. Good cattle are always in demand and bring higher prices than inferior stock. Mr. Graham's idea is to keep the best and feed without stinting them. Toronto is to-day the great market centre for export cattle. Montreal is practically out of that trade and few shipments are made from that port.
