OBITUARY. MRS. ROBERT HARGRAVE. Glenarm, Dec. 10.—On Tuesday morning, Nov. 26, the death occurred of Mrs. Robert Hargrave (nee Miss Bertie Christian) at her home about four miles north of Glenarm. Deceased was the second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Christian, of Islay. About five months have elapsed since her marriage, which time she has spent the greater part at the home of her parents. On Wednesday of the previous week she had driven to Lindsay to transact business with her husband and the following day she went to her own home. She had not had good health all summer, but the past two or three weeks she was gaining rapidly. On Monday she became very ill, medical aid was immediately summoned and everything possible was done to relieve her suffering. She lingered till about four o'clock Tuesday morning, when death ended her earthly career. Her funeral was held on Wednesday at 11 o'clock at the residence of her father, assisted by Rev. Steele, of Glenarm. Interment took place at Glenarm cemetery. A large number attended the funeral. Deceased was not quite 60 years of age and was highly respected by a wide circle of friends. Her husband, who is a well-known business man, is now in the hospital at the home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Hargrave, in the hour of sad bereavement.

PRICES SMASHED. Philadelphia, Dec. 11.—One hundred and fifty thousand dozen eggs were sold to-day at stations in various sections of the city by members of the Housekeepers' League in the first day of their campaign to break the corner which, they claim, has been maintained by retail dealers here. Eggs that have been selling for from twenty-seven to forty-nine cents a dozen were sold by the women at twenty-four cents. Such was the demand at the forty stations in operation to-day that only the inability to secure enough candlers prevented even a larger number being disposed of. An extra force of candlers have been engaged to work all night in order to have a supply ready for tomorrow.
