New Table Pad.
Formerly the good housekeeper was content to have a padding of cotton flannel cloth for the dining room table, but nowadays she may have an asbestos pad, which has the merit of keeping the table from damage by heat or moisture, a thing the flannel pad fails to do. These new pads can be made to order for tables of odd sizes and shapes, and in these days, when dollies be often displace damask cloths for luncheon and tea service, it is an undoubted advantage to keep one's table in the best possible condition, free from stains and spots.

Meal and Flour From Bananas.
There are in Jamaica six factories manufacturing figs, chips, meal and flour from bananas. During the season at which the fruit is cheapest all of these plants are run at their maximum capacity. The methods of drying the fruit are different in different plants, though all resort, I believe, to a hot air process. It takes about 400 to 500 pounds of the fruit to manufacture 100 pounds of meal.
The banana fig is as palatable as the natural fig and resembles it closely in color. It has replaced the natural fig in many markets in which it has been introduced. The chips are sold principally for breakfast foods, being made into a porridge.

\$48,000,000 ORDER

COLOSSAL AMOUNT EXPENDED FOR NEW EQUIPMENT DURING 1912.

COULD MOVE A FEW CITIES IN PASSENGER CARS THE C.P.R. NOW OWNS

Forty-eight millions of dollars in rolling stock, ordered in one year! That is what the Canadian Pacific Railway has done during 1912. It is an enormous sum of money for one corporation to appropriate in a twelve-month equipment. It is double the amount ever ordered by any other railway system in North America in the same period, and is tangible evidence that the C.P.R. is keeping pace with the development of Canada--no matter how swift it may be.

Part of the orders have already been delivered, and the balance is to be furnished as quickly as the shops can turn out the work.

When the orders are completely filled, the C.P.R. will have in commission 2,225 locomotives, 90,416 freight and stock cars of all kinds, 2,164 first and second class passenger coaches, and 512 tourist sleepers, standard sleepers, diners and cafe cars, 1,383 conductors' vans, 4,329 boarding, tool and auxiliary cars and steam shovels--to be operated on over 12,500 miles of track.

The new equipment ordered during 1912 includes 467 locomotives, 26,653 box cars, 936 flat cars, 401 coal cars, 300 stock cars, 227 refrigerator cars, 94 first-class sleepers, three compartment cars, 20 observation cars, 25 diners, 57 tourist cars, 117 first-class and suburban cars, 188 baggage, mail and express cars.

Four motor cars, which will climb up the side of the mountain from Lagan to the Lakes in the Clouds, will be placed in commission--the tracks having already been laid--and will prove a great convenience to the army of tourists which invades that picturesque region yearly.

The expenditure involved is \$48,000,000, of which locomotives cost over nine million dollars, the passenger train cars nearly five and a quarter millions of dollars, and the freight and miscellaneous cars over thirty-four million dollars. The equipment is being chiefly procured in Canada, but different shops being unable to fill the orders in their entirety, the remainder had to be purchased in the United States, in order to maintain delivery within a reasonable time.

The already enormous carrying capacity of the C.P.R. will be greatly increased when the new equipment is secured and distributed. The passenger cars would, if filled with travelers, move simultaneously 165,000 people, who would double the entire population of Ottawa, or the combined populations of Halifax and St. John, with Moncton, Fredericton, Amherst, Truro, Sydney, Windsor, etc., thrown in, or a couple of Calgarys, or the population of both Hamilton and London together, while the cars would carry comfortably all the men, women, and children of over fifty of the average-sized Canadian towns.

The immensity of these orders suggests the hundreds of thousands of tons of steel, the many millions of feet of lumber, and the gigantic army of men required to produce these huge quantities of material from their earliest stages in the mines and forests of Canada until the finished rolling stock is placed in service. Then, too, the host of people employed in the finishing and furnishing of the cars, and its various industries engaged in supplying the material, are to be counted; and when it is realized that a very large percentage of the cost price of any finished product is paid for labor, a faint idea may be gained of how largely the prosperity of a great railway system is an integral factor in the prosperity of Canada.
