MRS. JOHN HAWKINS.

The death of Mrs. John Hawkins took place after a brief illness at her home in Ballyduff on Thursday, Dec 12th, 1912. Mrs. Hawkins' maider name was Margaret Gould Watson born in Dundee, Scotland, Feb. 2nd, 1854, daughter of the late John Watson and his wife, whose maiden name was Sarah Lindsay. Mrs. Hawkins came to Canada when only a little girl four years of age, with her parents and family. At first the family settled in the township of Cartwright, but later moved to the township of Ops. It was while the family resided here that Mr. Hawkins met Miss Watson, and their marriage took place in 1875, the officiating clergyman being the Rev. N. Smitthett, D.D.
