#### AGRICULTURAL CONFERENCE.

Ottawa, Dec. 4.—A conference of agricultural representatives of each of the provinces will be held in Ottawa towards the close of the present winter, to decide upon the best method of expending the second installment of the government's \$10,000,000 grant in aid of agriculture. The total second-year grant is \$800,000, and of this \$230,880 will go to Ontario, which draws the biggest portion of the grant. Quebec will get \$187,738.


