

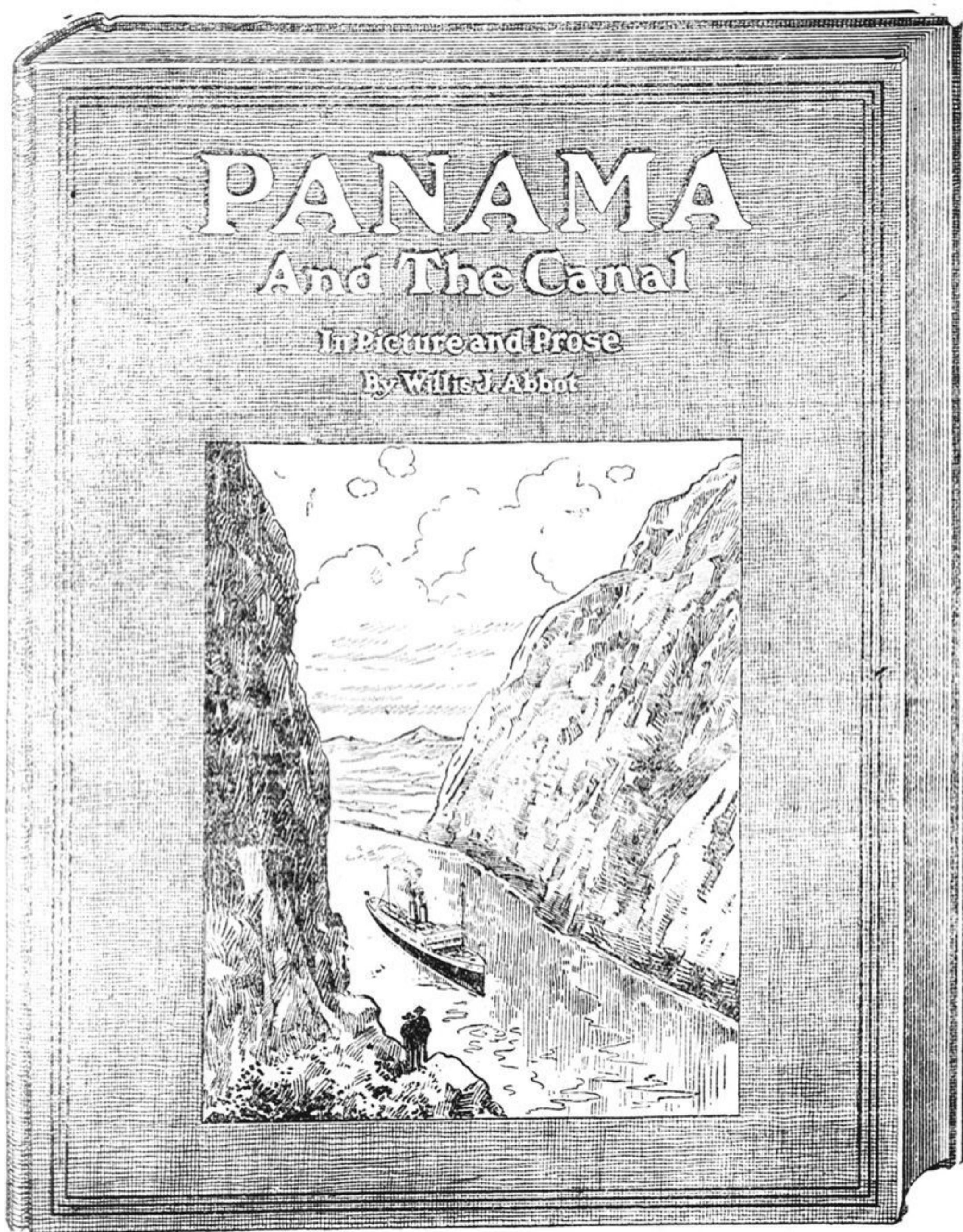
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Mr. Josiah Best, of Emily, was in town on Friday.

It also provides a striking instance of the value of ventilation in all homes. Don't keep your windows closed. Open some of them, at least, every night.—Havelock Standard.
