Little Britain Citizens on a Trip Around the World

Messrs. A. L. Campbell and D. Cinnamon, two of the Lindsay globe-trippers, paid a visit to Little Britain Friday, and for over two hours entertained the citizens of that thriving village with exceedingly interesting and instructive tales of travel. The entertainment was held in the Christian Church under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid, there being a goodly attendance of the residents. The speakers were particularly pleased to see so many of the younger generation present, as the addresses could not help being instructive to them in the way of a practical geography and history lesson. Both speakers were in splendid form and despite the fact that in the course of their travels they covered

itself was very remarkable because of the unlimited quantity of mud. Before having the paved streets in Lindsay it was thought that the county town of Victoria had lots of mud, but she could not compare with Halifax.

The trip across the Atlantic, some 2,700 miles, was made in very decent weather, although many of the passengers were compelled to take to their cabins on account of the angry sea. Sable Island and the grave yard of the Atlantic were passed, as well as the coast of Newfoundland and the coast of Ireland; Liverpool and its magnificent harbor, crowded with innumerable sailing vessels of all descriptions was a sight worth seeing. London, the hub of Old England, its Westminster Abbey, Tower of London, Billingsgate, fish market, convent gardens and flower markets, St. Paul's church and its famous whispering gallery, the splendid lot of metropolitan police and the renowned London fog, were all described in an interesting manner.

A side trip across to France was enjoyed, and the strange feature of the trip was that after journeying 22 miles the language, religion, customs, government and almost everything was changed. Paris was truly a beautiful city devoid of smoke, because of the fact that all the factories are built on the outer outskirts of the gay city. The houses are magnificent and erected under a rigid inspection, i.e., a \$400 house could not be erected alongside a \$40,000 house, as every house was valued and erected in the proper vicinity. Returning to London and Liverpool the party embarked once more and reached Gibraltar, that old and substantial citadel of the British Empire. The fortress was visited, but not before the members of the party were relieved of their kodaks. Gibraltar, a veritable rock, projects some 1500 feet out of the earth, and of a population of some 25,000, five thousand are British

soldiers. The city is surrounded completely by a huge wall, the gates of which are opened at 6 a.m., and no ship is allowed to enter the harbor before the same hour, or leave after a certain hour in the evening. All the water for washing, drinking and otherwise, is secured by rainfall.

At Monaco, a panoramic city with red tile roofs and brick walls painted a yellow or green color, Messrs. Flavelle and Hopkins were met. Approaching Nice they saw the women by scores washing their clothing in the bay. Monte Carlo and the famous casino were very interesting, the casino, the world-wide licensed gambling house, being a beautiful place, both as to exterior and interior. A small admission fee was paid and once inside it was noticed that the majority of those frequenting the tables were women over fifty years of age, while the men were also about the same age. This place is visited by some 50,000 tourists daily.

Port Said owes its existence to the Suez Canal, and it costs the C.P.R. just \$14,000 in tolls to pass through this channel. The desert was a picturesque sight, both by day and by moonlight, although the sand was ankle deep and hot. Everything has only had about five minutes rainfall in twelve years there is very little need for a roof on the dwelling places of the people. At Cairo the change in the civilization of the country was remarkable, and the trippers found them using the plow of 100 years ago, as well as the scythe and other crude instruments for tilling purposes. The pyramids, some of them 450 feet high and the sides 750 feet wide were impressive and interesting.

MR. CINNAMON.

Mr. D. Cinnamon, the second speaker of the evening, took up his journey where the previous speaker left off, taking the audience some 3,000 miles to Colombo, passing some of the most ancient country in the world, down through the Red Sea (so named after its barren shores, with the reddish rock in the background, which reflects upon the waters of the sea) the atmosphere all the while being exceedingly hot. As they neared the vicinity of the equator they enjoyed the novel experience of having equal day and night (12 hours each). On the way to the Island of Ceylon and City of Kandy many rice fields were noticed, most of them being under water, and it was noticed that all the tillable land, even on the many high hills, was worked up in terraces. The roads were the best the party ever traveled on. In Kandy the Temple of the Tooth of Buddha was visited. In Colombo all kinds of tropical plants and flowers were seen in profusion, the whole country being like a huge park.

To Singapore meant another 1700 miles, and here the Chinese element was met, the place being thickly populated. The rubber plantations, the mosques and other places of interest were visited. When entering the mosques it is necessary to take off one's shoes, or encase the feet in huge and awkward slippers. A couple of missions, one a Roman Catholic and the other a native mission, were visited. On Sunday the speaker attended church service, and the following day was present at a native police court, all of which was interesting.

Hong Kong, 1500 miles away, was next visited, the capital of the island being the city of Victoria. To Canton was 90 miles by the Canton river. In the bay of Hong Kong tens of thousands of san pans were noticed laying idly by, all laden with their human cargo, the Chinese using them for their homes. In Can-

ton the streets are from 6 to 8 feet wide and travel in sedan chairs, carried by three Chinamen, was the best mode of travel for the tourists. Canton is not much larger than Lindsay, yet has a population of four million and is said to be the most wicked city in the world. Among the interesting works visited here was the King Fisher Feather works, where all kinds of fine jewelry is manufactured from the beautiful feathers of the King Fisher. The work is so fine that many of the workmen cannot stand it any longer than three years without going blind. They are great people for fine jewelry, beautiful furniture and silk. In the silk factories many of the expert workmen design the most beautiful silks without a pattern, and the highest wage for the expert is about 50 cents a day in Canadian money, while the children receive about 3 cents.

The old water clock, said to have been built some years before the birth of Christ, is still in use in a high tower, and by this clock the natives can tell time accurately. It consists of four buckets of water placed one above the other, the water passing through from one to the other, the entire process taking exactly twelve hours. To Shanghai, some 800 miles away, the weather became much cooler. The city was ancient and historical, and here magnificent homes were noticed in the foreign section; houses equal to those to be found in Toronto and Montreal. A trip to Koly, some 400 miles away was made by route of inland sea.

"In the Japanese homes there were no chairs, the natives sitting on mats; no beds, the natives using a thin mattress; paper windows instead of glass and partitions in the house made of bamboo. The trees were magnificent, especially the pine, and they were thought as much of as the flowers—almost worshipped. The party passed through a wonderful canal, built under the mountains, which took eight years to construct. The speaker stated that the Japs were becoming experts in archery, fencing, wrestling, etc., and were people to be feared in the future. They were courteous and obliging, as well as many, and the speaker had heard more bad language in five minutes in a Lindsay restaurant than he heard on the whole trip through Japan. At Tokio the Emperor's palace was interesting, as well as the innumerable avenues of trees. In closing the speaker stated that although their language and customs were different, their music was the same and the regimental Japanese bands could play beautiful music. "When Japan awakes and realizes her strength," said Mr. Cinnamon, "and unite and work together the rest of the world will have to sit up and think."

Turner, last Sunday, of his resignation from the pulpits to take up a course in Knox College, of Toronto. Mr. and Mrs. Turner have been with us for eleven years and we only wish we could keep them many more.

AFTER REPEASING. The municipal horseshoe of Martiposa states that Mr. A. J. Varcoe, the popular Reeve of Martiposa, will again be in the field for the re-election for 1914. There is no doubt but the electors of the Banner Township will rally around Mr. Varcoe, who has proved himself an elegant municipal servant since assuming office, and through his wise and intelligent views on municipal affairs in the County Council has won for himself the highest regards by the members.

ONE KILLED IN BOWMANVILLE. Bowmanville, Ont., Dec. 12.—The flyer going west this morning crashed into the rear end of a freight train, also going west, just this side of Oshawa, about five o'clock this morning, killing one man and injuring three others; also piled about twenty freight cars with contents on side of track. Freight should have remained at Bowmanville, but by some means went through. Name of man killed unknown.
