CANADIANS WON AGAIN AT CHICAGO SHOW

Chicago, Dec. 3. — Canada won again to-day. After capturing the World's Grand Championship steer prize yesterday it was expected that the Dominion would submit to a relapse to-day and give the Stars and Stripes a chance at the International Live Stock Show, but such was not the case.

It was announced by the horse show judges in the Arena that Canadian exhibitors had captured four firsts in the Clydesdale classes to the Americans' three. Up to late in the afternoon the race between the two countries had been close. Hopes of rooters of the States, however, were downed when it was announced that Colony Lady Degg, owned by the Colony Farm of Coquitlam, B.C., had taken the blues in her class, making the score four to three for the Canadians.

Of the Canadian winners for the day, British Columbia carried off two firsts, one second, one fourth, and one sixth; Saskatchewan, one first, two seconds, one third and one fifth; and Ontario, one first and two thirds.

McGregor, Brandon, Man., the champion's owner, announced that the great bull will begin an "all star tour" after the close of the Exposition. The start will be made at the Manitoba Agricultural College at Winnipeg.

CANADIAN SHEEP WIN.

Canadian sheep exhibitors have things all their own way in the fat classes. In Lincolns, H. M. Lee of Highgate, Ont., has won three firsts and a championship, also third and fourth. J. D. Brien of Ridgetown and John Kelley of Shakespeare each have seconds. In Cotswolds, J. D. Brien of Ridgetown has one first and two seconds and the champion wether; E. Brien & Sons, Ridgetown, have two firsts and one second. E. D. Park of Burford is also in the money.

John Kelley, Shakespeare, has a third, firsts and the championship in fat Leicester. A. and W. Whitlaw, Guelph, are among the winners. In breeding Cotswolds, E. D. Park, Burford, Ont., wins three firsts and a champion ram; E. Brien & Sons win one second and two thirds.

The Canada First Candidate

Arthur Hawkes, the Canada First candidate in the South Lanark campaign, received a blow in the solar plexus direct from the shoulder of the people. Maybe not because of his policy—or platform—but because he shoved his way into a constituency where he was not known and perhaps not wanted. 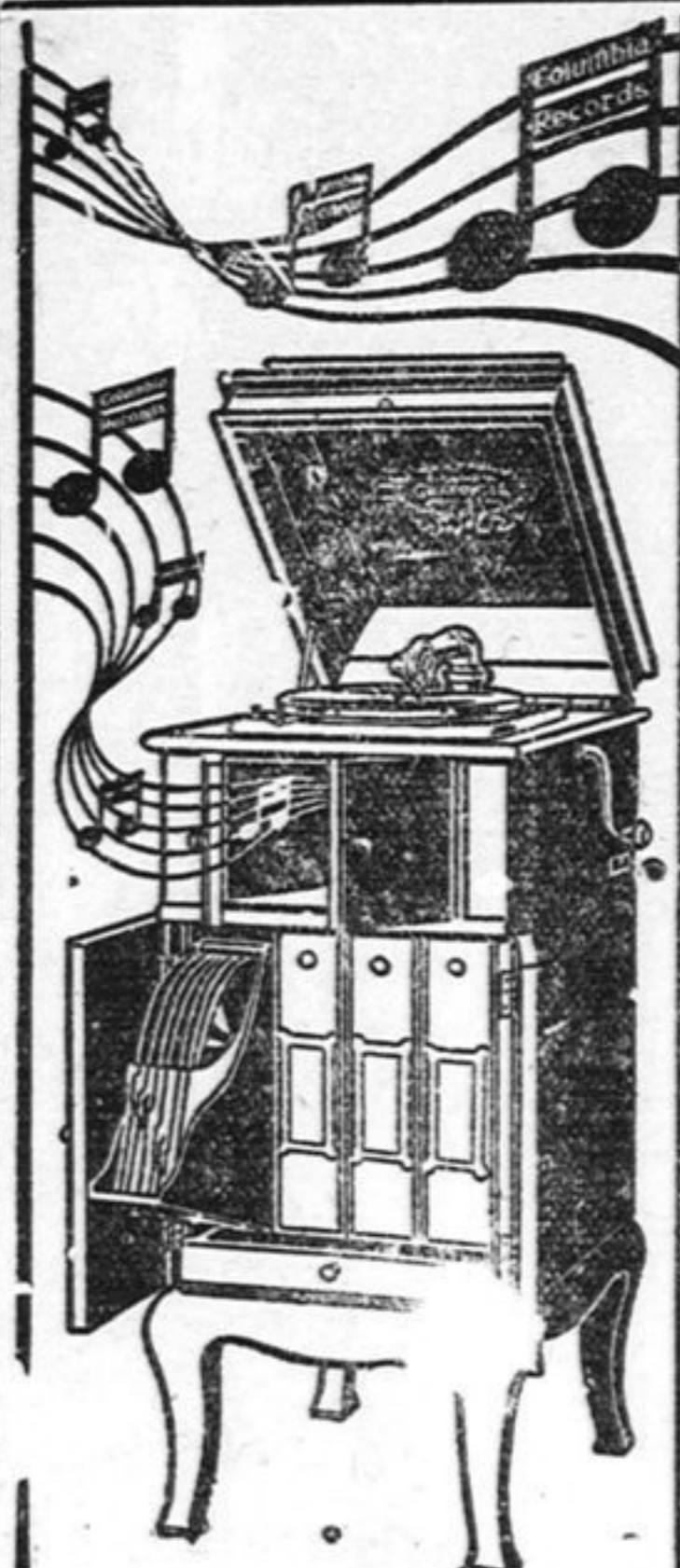

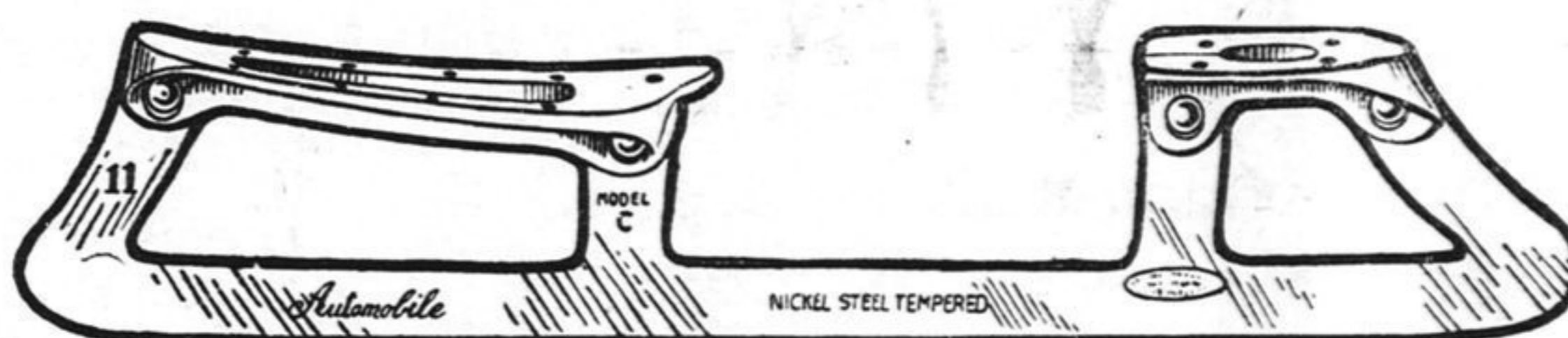
