BY-LAW No. 439

A BY-LAW TO PROHIBIT THE SALE BY RETAIL OF SPIRITUOUS, FERMENTED OR OTHER MANUFACTURED LIQUORS IN THE MUNICIPALITY OF THE TOWNSHIP OF BEKLEY.

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Bekley hereby enacts as follows:

1. That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented, or other manufactured liquors is and shall be prohibited in every tavern, inn or other house of public entertainment in the said municipality...

2. This by-law shall come into force and take effect as from the first day of May next, after the final passing thereof.

(4) That the Seventh day of January, A.D. 1914, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, has been appointed as a time, when and place where the Clerk will sum up the number of votes given for and against the said proposed by-law.

Liquor Restrictions

The possibility of further provincial restriction of the liquor traffic is under consideration. The next regulation will probably close all bars in the Province at 1 o'clock on Saturday, and for the entire day on legal holidays. The arguments presented to the Government in advocating shorter hours of sale on ordinary weekdays have been pressed strongly in reference to the new proposal. The case of the workman who is now relieved of the temptation of a morning "nip" before work, is revived, to show that his salary envelope is in special danger on the last afternoon of the week.

The question of prohibition on holidays has been under cabinet consideration for some time. A special bill dealing with Good Friday restriction was voted down last session, on the understanding that the Government would enquire into the feasibility of a more universal measure.

The steel trade, always looked upon as an unfailing barometer, furnishes a good illustration of the general trend. 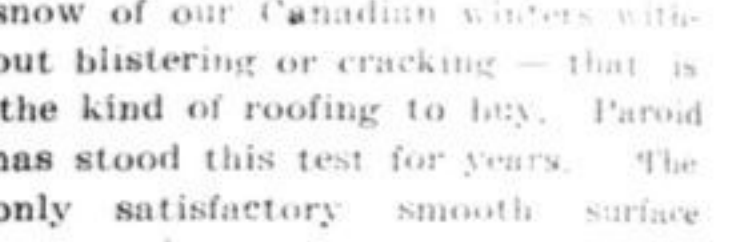
