May 6, Jubilee Day Proclaimed Holiday

Ottawa, March 13.—Proclamations are to be posted in every post office in Canada proclaiming May 6th, Jubilee Day, a public holiday, it was announced here. The King's proclamation has been sent out from the secretary of State Department.

In connection with the jubilee the Bank of Canada revealed that it would issue a special \$25 bill to commemorate the 25th anniversary of King George's accession to the throne.

The Government has already announced issue of a silver dollar description of which were reported last month. Detailed description of the new bill was not immediately available.
