Growing Cabbages.

The cabbage is a plant that is a rank feeder, and to attain perfection requires a rich soil and abundant moisture during its early stages of growth. For field culture as a food for cows in the fall it can be grown by the farmer to great profit. We grew half an acre of them one year with that special object, and made a good return from the investment of our time and labor. The land hill lying between the barn yard and a small stream of water. This was ploughed very deeply late in spring, and again in July.
