Special Meeting Village Council

A special meeting of the Bobcaygeon Council was held in the Council Chamber, Town Hall, on Monday, June 19th. Present: Reeve A. R. Bottum, presiding; Councillors J. J. Devitt, R. J. Henderson, W. G. G. Dreyer and Jos. W. Staples.

Moved by Mr. Devitt, and seconded by Mr. Staples, that the Council purchase adequate fire fighting equipment.—Carried.

Tenders for fire engine were received from C. A. Gordon for a Johnson pumper at \$700.00.

Bickle Fire Engine Co., for Chevrolet, Pontiac or Ford chassis at \$2200, for Buick chassis \$2300 with old engines.

Segrave Fire Engine Co., Ford "8" chassis, Centrifugal pump, \$2700.00, rotary pump, \$2400.00 without old engines.

La France Fire Engine Co., Buick chassis and motor, \$2550.00 without old engines.

Moved by Mr. Dreyer, that Bickle Engine Co. tender at \$2300.00 with old equipment be accepted.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Staples, that LaFrance tender for \$2550.00 without old equipment be accepted.

No seconder for either motion.

Moved by Mr. Henderson, and seconded by Mr. Dreyer, that a cash price be obtained from all, not including old equipment, as the representatives of the three firms were in attendance (outside). Reeve was appointed to get the cash prices at once.—Carried.

Bickle and Segrave prices were each reduced \$100.00 without old equipment. La France would not alter the original price.

Mr. Dreyer again moved to purchase Bickle outfit—no seconder.

Mr. Staples left his original motion stand and was seconded by Mr. Devitt.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Henderson, that Council purchase Johnson pumper at \$700.00 and repair our present outfit.

Moved by Mr. Henderson, that last motion be withdrawn and moved that Council dispose of present equipment before purchasing a new outfit.

As no seconder to any motion but Mr. Staples' to purchase La France outfit, Reeve declared that motion carried.

Sale of old equipment was left with Fire Committee, Messrs Henderson and Staples.

Moved by Mr. Devitt, and seconded by Mr. Staples, that Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign contract with La France Fire Engine Co. for purchase of outfit.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Devitt, and seconded by Mr. Henderson, that the following accounts be passed and cheques be issued.—Carried: Ralph Watson, trip to Kirkfield for crushed stone, \$10.00; Pay Sheet No. 6, \$107.20.

On motion of Mr. Staples, Council adjourned.

Council Meet as Court of Revision

The Bobcaygeon Council met as Court of Revision in the Council Chamber, Town Hall, on Monday, June 12th. The following took declaration as members of the Court: A. R. Bottum, J. J. Devitt, R. J. Henderson, W. G. G. Dreyer and Jos. W. Staples.

Moved by Mr. Henderson, and seconded by Mr. Staples, that Mr. Bottum be chairman.—Carried.

The following appeals were heard: Hattie A. Davis, buildings assessed too high. Moved by Mr. Dreyer, and seconded by Mr. Devitt, that assessment on Rockland House be reduced \$1000.00, making assessment \$5950.00.—Carried.

Moses Gelber and Louis Gelber, over-assessed. Moved by Mr. Staples, and seconded by Mr. Henderson, that both assessments be confirmed.—Carried.

John Jaffray, assessed too high. Moved by Mr. Devitt, and seconded by Mr. Henderson, that assessment be confirmed.—Carried.

Geo. Mac Gregor, against business tax, and does not own lots 4 and 5, east of Francis Street, 4 and 5, east of West Street, north half lot 10 and lots 11, 12 and 13, west of Anne Street. Moved by Mr. Staples, and seconded by Mr. Dreyer, that business tax be not charged, as he was not doing business.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Devitt, and seconded by Mr. Henderson, that the foregoing lots be reported to the Crown Lands Department and Mr. McGregor be not assessed for same as he does not own them.—Carried.

Herbert McGee, assessed too high. Moved by Mr. Henderson, and seconded by Mr. Dreyer, that assessment be confirmed.—Carried.

C. H. Pardy, over-assessed and against business tax as a holder of a Standard Hotel License. Moved by Mr. Devitt, and seconded by Mr. Staples, that business tax be struck off.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Devitt, and seconded by Mr. Henderson, that assessment be confirmed.—Carried.

On motion of Messrs Dreyer and Henderson, Court of Revision adjourned.

Moved by Mr. Devitt, and seconded by Mr. Henderson, that the Clerk be authorized to make the following changes in the Assessment Roll: lot 3, east Maine divided and a portion assessed to C. St. Thomas, Mrs. Florence MacWilliams assessed Isabella Davidson Estate, G. Kittle lot designated as south half 5, east Sherwood Street.

On motion of Messrs Dreyer and Henderson, Court of Revision adjourned.

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Obituary

LATE JAMES HAMILTON MOORE

Word was received in town on Sunday, last, of the death of James Hamilton Moore, of Regina, Saskatchewan, an old Bobcaygeon boy and son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Moore.

The late Mr. Moore passed away on Saturday, last. He was born in Bobcaygeon 54 years ago, was raised here and also went into business here. He married Annie Hunter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Hunter, Scotch Line. Before going west he sold his business in Bobcaygeon to the late Ed. Woods.

Left to mourn are two daughters, Louise and Myrtle, both school teachers; a sister, Mrs. Wilson (Minnie), of Omamee; a brother, G. B. Moore, of Bobcaygeon; a half brother, W. C. Moore, of Bobcaygeon; three half sisters, Mrs. Orser of Toronto, Mrs. Mitchell of Rochester, N. Y., and Mrs. Geo. McGregor of Bobcaygeon.

Funeral service was held from the family residence, lot 18, concession 5, Verulam, on Saturday, June 17th at 2 p.m. Interment took place at Verulam Cemetery.

Out of town friends, were from Port Hope, Toronto, Peterboro, Cavan, and Fenelon Falls. In Rev. Gardner's absence, Rev. M. L. Hinton, of Castleton, former pastor of Bobcaygeon United Church, officiated assisted by Rev. Dreyer of the Anglican Church. The floral tributes were very beautiful.

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E. Kelso Pleads Not To Be Sent To Guelph

"Please don't send me to the jail farm at Guelph," pleaded Everett Kelso to His Worship Magistrate Jordan in the police court Tuesday morning.

Everett Kelso, who escaped from the Guelph Reformatory on March 17, pleaded guilty to a charge of stealing a car from Poole's garage in Bobcaygeon. Magistrate Jordan granted the strange request of the prisoner, not to be sent to the Reformatory, and sentenced him to two years in the Kingston Penitentiary, the minimum sentence for prisoners sent to this institution.

Kelso, as he appeared in police court, looked more like a respectable young gentleman, than a criminal who had spent eight years of his life behind the bars. He pleaded guilty to a charge of theft laid by constable Herb. Nicholls of Bobcaygeon, who made the arrest.

Before the magistrate gave his verdict Kelso pleaded with him for as light a sentence as possible, but not to be sent back to Guelph under any circumstances.

"Someone there has a pick on me," said Everett Kelso, "and I just can't bear it." This was probably the reason he escaped from Guelph on March 17. Kelso did not explain how he made his getaway but he is quoted as having said that he just walked away.

He had been hiding with friends in Bobcaygeon, and probably would still have his freedom if he had not stolen the car. Kelso said he would be able to straighten up if he could stay away from Cayceon when he was at liberty, but once he got back to his home town there was always too much home to start him in the wrong path again.

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Government Lecturer Gives Address

Mr. J. F. Clark, Government Lecturer in Horticulture, Toronto, gave a very fine address on "Continuous Bloom in the Garden" in the Town Hall, on Tuesday evening of last week.

Mr. Clark dealt with the various bulbs, shrubs, perennials and annuals in their different stages.

The officers and directors of the Horticultural Society invited Mr. Clark to Bobcaygeon to give his lecture so as to give the people a chance to learn just how to plant and care for bulbs and plants and it seems too bad that more did not take advantage of this instructive address.

Mr. Lane, of Valentia, accompanied Mr. Clark. After the meeting Mrs. A. R. Bottum entertained the speakers, also the officers and directors, with their wives and husbands, serving lunch.

Messrs Clark and Lane motored to Cobocok that evening as Mr. Clark was due to lecture in Cobocok on Wednesday morning, his evenings being booked for some time.

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
