Victoria County School Fairs 1933

Prize lists have now been printed and are being forwarded to the Teachers.

During the past two years in order to economize seeds were not furnished the pupils and exhibits were made from crops grown on the home farm. This year the Department of Education furnished a package of vegetable seed as well as a package of flower seed to each pupil which will be an added incentive.

The programme prepared for School Fair Day has been enlarged and should be more interesting. The School parade and Strathcona Drill will be followed by Recitation and Public Speaking Competitions, Spelling Match and Sports. In the morning the pupils will have Judging Competitions, Weed Naming and Naming the parts of animals.

Local Judges will again act as last year and the Public School Inspectors are co-operating to the greatest extent with the Agricultural Representative Branch.

CORN VARIETIES STUDIED

Five demonstration experiments have been undertaken this year by the Department of Field Husbandry, Ontario Agricultural College, in an effort to determine the varieties of corn best suited for seed production in south-western Ontario.

Previous to the advent of the Corn Borer in Ontario, the counties of Kent and Essex produced three-quarters of the corn grown in the Dominion, and with the removal of the export restrictions that were imposed in an effort to check the advance of this insect, every effort has been made to re-establish this industry.

Five demonstration plots of one acre each have been laid down by the Department on two farms in Kent and the three in Essex. Ten varieties of corn, including some of the old Ontario strains and a few of the more promising American, and "Borer Resistant" types will be grown for purposes of comparison.

The same experiment is also being run on three farms in Peel County, to determine the relative values of the ten varieties for the production of silage. Yield and earliness of maturity will be the chief considerations in making the selections.

Red Raspberry Jam

4 cups (2 lbs.) prepared fruit
6 1/2 cups (2 3/4 lbs.) sugar
1/2 bottle fruit pectin

To prepare fruit, crush or grind about 2 quarts fully ripe berries. Measure sugar and prepared fruit into large kettle, mix well, and bring to a fully rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 1 minute. Remove from fire and stir in fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for just 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Pour quickly. Paraffin hot jam at once. Makes about 10 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).

Fisher Body Craftsman's Guild

Oshawa, June 12.—Young craftsmen of the Dominion—50,000 strong—began a period of intensive work this month, with the goal of university scholarships and free trips to the Century of Progress Exposition urging them on to finish construction of their miniature model Napoleonic coaches. In all centres of Canada, boys are pouring over detail plans, using minute tools in expert craftsmanship and moulding elaborate and beautiful model coaches into shape. They are members of the Fisher Body Craftsman's Guild, competing in the second annual competition for awards totalling \$85,000.

Guild membership in Canada this year has exceeded all expectations, according to R. S. McLaughlin, president of General Motors of Canada, Limited, and president, also, of the Canadian section of the Fisher Body Craftsman's Guild. A total enrollment three times as large as last year, he said, showed an increasing interest among the younger generation in the type of work that develops

the skilled craftsman.

Fourteen Canadian boys, representing seven provincial districts, will make the journey to Chicago in August as guests of the Guild. For building the best model coaches in their class, they will receive, in addition, cash awards of \$100 each. Most coveted of all the awards, however, will be the two university scholarships, valued at \$5,000 each, which go to the best Canadian boy craftsman in junior and senior age divisions.

Before joining the 122 Guild members from the United States who will be at the Chicago World's Fair, the Canadian group will gather in Toronto for a two-day convention. It will be a week packed with interest and thrills and its lure should keep every Guild member hard at his task to insure completion of a real winner within the allotted time. All models must be finished and delivered before midnight of June 30th. Notification is being sent out from Guild Headquarters in Oshawa, telling each boy where and how to deliver his model.

SPRAY SELERY FOR BLIGHT CONTROL (Experimental Farms Note)

One of the major problems confronting the vegetable grower in the production of celery is late blight, and the returns he receives from the sale of his crop depend to a large extent upon his ability to control this disease.

Late blight is caused by a fungus organism which overwinters in the soil on dead celery refuse. Under favourable conditions the spores from this fungus infect young celery plants in the field and if the crop is not properly protected, the disease soon spreads and causes irreparable damage.

Most celery growers appreciate the necessity of spraying to control the disease, but do not realize that the applications of fungicide should commence before the blight appears. Do not wait until the disease has become established before trying to combat it. Spraying operations should be commenced while the plants are still in the seed-bed and additional thorough applications made to the crop in the field every ten days or two weeks throughout the growing season. In order to obtain adequate control it is absolutely essential that all parts of the plant be thoroughly covered with the spray because it is on the lower, less accessible leaves where the disease first appears and from them it spreads to the remainder of the plant.

There has been considerable experimental work conducted at the Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology, St. Catharines, in order to discover the best spray mixture to apply to the celery crop. It has been

found that good control can be obtained by thorough spraying with Bordeaux mixture, but if a spreader such as calcium caseinate is added to the fungicide, its effectiveness is considerably increased. Copper-lime dusts have also given effective control where the applications have been made when the dew was still on the plants.

BLUE ROSE BEING INTRODUCED

Two new roses that give promise of making the greatest achievement in rose culture within recent years have been received from Europe by the Dept. of Horticulture, Ontario Agricultural College. These novelties have been planted in the test garden operated jointly by the Rose Society of Ontario and the College, to determine their suitability to Canadian conditions.

The blue rose, General Stefanik, brings this colour into the rose world for the first time. It was originated in Czechoslovakia, as the result of a cross between the hybrid perpetual La Brillante and an unnamed seedling. In its native country the bush is vigorous and blooms freely in June and July, bearing very large, double, azure blue flowers, on long stems.

The results of the tests with Golden Dream, a German introduction, will also be closely watched as, at present, there are no climbing roses on the market having recurrent, golden-yellow, fragrant blooms. Neither of these roses has, as yet, appeared in commerce on this continent, but both of the plants should be in bloom during Farm and Home Week (June 19th to 23rd) and will be seen by the hundreds who will visit the College at that time.
