Three unidentified young thugs attempted to break into Woollard's Drug Store on Wednesday evening for the second time within two months. The incident occurred about 1 a.m.

The burglars parked their 1936 Ford V-8 coupe about 100 yards away from the store, near Dr. Kelly's residence and attempted to make entry into the drug store from the rear, using the crowbar which was used in the robbery a few months ago.

They were frightened off however by the timely arrival of the night watchman. Returning to the front of the store they again attempted to make entry there but were finally frightened off.

They sped out of Bobcaygeon and arrived in Lindsay where they stole ten gallons of gas and continued through the Ontario Legislature at imately 70 miles per hour. They also broke into stores at Markham and Stouffville stealing goods worth over \$200 in Stouffville.

The Toronto police were notified and located the men on Dovercourt Road and chased them to Queens Park where they finally lost them.

The license number was taken and was found to be stolen from a Buick coup which was stolen in July.

"I think a very definite change has come about in the attitude of a large number of English people who are neighbors of French-speaking Canadians regarding the necessity of learning French," he said.

Learn Conversation

"The trouble is that the only place in numerous Ontario counties where English children hear a word of French is in the classrooms, and they are too busy learning the grammar of the language to learn how to use it in conversation.

"We hope to make certain changes so that less attention will be paid in the earlier stages of teaching French to the dry structure of the grammar."

C.I.O. MOVE DEFIED BY PREMIER HEPBURN

WON'T GET FAR WITH CIVIL SERVICE INVASION, HE SAYS

TORONTO, Aug. 10—Determined attempts have been made by the C.I.O. within recent weeks to get a foothold in the Ontario Civil Service and the Dominion Civil Service it was learned at Queen's Park yesterday.

The threatened invasion is said to have reached the point, in so far as the Ontario service is concerned, where several employees of one of the outside branches of employment have actually signed up.

It is understood that plans of the C.I.O. call for a gradual but persistent appeal to the lower-salaried employees of the Government, and for the appointment of certain liaisons to people to keep those people in touch with the C.I.O. organization.

Premier Hepburn last night, admitted to the Globe and Mail that "They are trying to get in, but I don't think they will get very far."

"We have full knowledge of what they have been doing," said he, "and, needless to say, we are watching them very closely."

He refused to comment when asked what action, if any, would be taken in regard to any employees who already had identified themselves with the organization.
