CAMPERS' FIRE BRINGS FINE—CHARGE UNDER FOREST ACT.

Information laid by District Forester H. W. Crosbie of Tweed resulted in Thomas Forbes, Toronto, a police constable of that city, and Bruce Gould of Gould's Crossing, being brought before Police Magistrate Moore at Lindsay yesterday, on the following charge.

"That they did in the Township of Clamorgan, on the 13th day of August, during close season, start a fire out-of-doors for cooking, and failed to select a place as free from inflammable material as possible, contrary to the regulations under the Forest Fire Prevention Act of Ontario."

Both men pleaded guilty, and each was fined \$25.00 and costs, which is the minimum fine for this offence. The bringing of these men to court should be a warning to all others who do not live up to the Forest Fire Prevention Act regulations when camping.

VICTORIA COUNTY SCHOOL FAIRS

The attention of Rural School pupils is now centered on the School Fairs which this year number fifteen. The new addition is being held at Hali-burton in the Inspectorship of Mr. G. Pentland. A total of one hundred and two schools with an enrollment of two thousand one hundred and sixty six pupils are this year taking part.

New features are the Live Stock and Home Economics Judging Competitions, the Championship will be contested for at the Lindsay Central Exhibition on September 19th. Liberal prizes for these are offered by the Exhibition which is vitally interested in the children of the country. The parade and Strathcona Drill are also changed considerably and will not be judged this year but each school is expected to take part and help this part of the days programme.

The attention of the pupils is drawn to the following suggestions.

1. All Live Stock must be born on or after January 1st. last Animals will count 60% and handling 40%.

2. In the Live Stock Judging only Dairy Cattle will be judged at the local fairs. Where arrangement can be made boys will be taken to near farms for this work, otherwise calves will be judged. The winners of each fair will judge Dairy Cattle and Swine at the Lindsay Exhibition. A bulletin entitled "Hints on Judging" has been forwarded to each school. Read this Bulletin and get some one in the neighborhood to give you a few lessons.

3. Home Economics Competition will be conducted at noted in Prize List, with Championship at Lindsay Fair. Championship prizes will be as follows, \$10.00, \$8.00, \$6.00, \$4.00, \$2.00.

4. In the parade and Strathcona Drill the Schools as far as possible will compete at one time, orders being given by one person. These orders are being sent to the teachers in a letter.

5. In the Lindsay Fair Special for the Best Beef Calf, the Directors have reduced the prizes to \$7.00, \$5.00, \$3.00, \$1.00 because it was felt that these entries could compete in the regular classes.

ADVANTAGES OF TREATING GRAIN WITH FORMALIN

1. Seed grain treated with formalin, if it has been thoroughly dried and aired, can if necessary be used for feeding purposes.

Formaldehyde is sold under the name of Formalin, which is a 40% solution of formaldehyde. It can be purchased in drug stores by the pound or by the pint (20 ounces). Barrels or pails are not injured by formalin and so may be used for holding the solution when treating the seed.

DISADVANTAGES OF TREATING GRAIN WITH FORMALIN

1. The grain is wet and it frequently takes considerably time to dry it so that it can be sown with a drill.

2. Germination is frequently injured especially if the grain is not sown for some time after treating, or if the soil is very dry at seeding time.

Copper Carbonate Dust Treatment For The Prevention Of Stinking Smut OF WHEAT and Smut on Hulless OATS

DIRECTIONS. This dust should be applied at the rate of from 2 to 3 ounces per bushel, depending upon the amount of smut present. Dust mixing machines are now in the market for applying dust rapidly to large amounts of grain. Put the grain and the copper carbonate dust into the mixing machine and rotate for two or three minutes, or until every grain is thoroughly covered with dust. It is advisable to wear a dust mask or a wet handkerchief over the nose and mouth while treating the grain. If a smut treatment machine is not available, a barrel churn or an ordinary barrel fastened in a frame or some types of cement mixers may be used for treating grain.

ADVANTAGES OF TREATING WITH COPPER CARBONATE DUST

1. It does not injure germination.

2. Seed can be treated whenever convenient and stored without injury.

3. Dusted seed can be sown at any time in dry or moist soil.

DISADVANTAGES OF TREATING WITH COPPER CARBONATE DUST

1. Treated seed cannot be used for feeding or milling purposes.

2. Treated seed must be kept dry and should not be allowed to stand in the seed drill under moist conditions.

3. Any dust that collects in the seed drill should be cleaned out, as it may become caked and injure the drill.

If the drill has not been used for a few hours, it is advisable to rock the wheels before starting to loosen the grain and the gears.
