Strathmore Sylvia, prize pure-bred Holstein from the Canadian Pacific Railway Experimental Farm at Strathmore, Alberta, held the record of all Canada last year for her production of 29,371 pounds of milk and 1267 pounds of butter. She had her day-out at the Calgary Exhibition and Stampede at Calgary recently, when with others from the herd of 600 at the farm she was admired by thousands of visitors. Just to impress on them what she had done, 370 eight-gallon milk cans were arranged around the entire Canadian Pacific Holstein exhibit, these being the number required to hold the milk Sylvia produced. 1267 one-pound butter cartons formed an arch at one end, emphasizing her butter production.

Here and There

Canada has one motor vehicle for every nine persons of population. A recent estimate places the aggregate number of motor vehicles in the Dominion at 1,076,819. Only three countries exceed Canada in heavier density of motor cars, namely, United States, with one for every 5.11 persons; Hawaiian Islands 7.9 persons, and New Zealand 8.0 persons.

The New England conscience got busy recently in a small town in Massachusetts when a resident mailed back anonymously to the maitre d'hotel of the Royal York. Toronto, a package of spoons, serviettes and dining room "sundries" borrowed some time previously. The writer, in returning the articles to Monsieur Maillard, the maitre, said: "My conscience has been bothering me a great deal since and I have been unable to keep them any longer."

The Stoney Indians, Alberta, cannot be said to be a "vanishing race," for while the section of the tribe living on the Nordegg reserve was making a two-week trek to attend the annual Indian pow-wow at Banff, four babies were born. Mothers and children are all healthy and

Last spring a man came into the C. P. R. ticket office on Sparks street, Ottawa, for a ticket to Leonard where he had a job. He was five cents shy on his fare, but the railway gave him a ticket anyway. The other day a man in overalls walked into the Sparks street office and said: "I owe you five cents on a ticket; here it is."

Hon. Chas. Stewart, Minister of the Interior, who has been flying over the Rocky Mountains recently. announced at Banff that the buffalo herd there will be augmented shortly by addition of animals specially selected from the herds at Wainwright and Elk Island.

Canadians are the world's greatest butter eaters. A recent compilation made by the Canadian Government Bureau of Statistics shows that the total consumption of butter in the Dominion last year was 230,000,000 pounds or a per capita consumption for the year of 29.31 pounds, an increase of nearly half a pound per head of population compared with 1927.

J. M. R. Fairbairn, chief engineer, Canadian Pacific Railway, and Dr. F. A. Gaby, chief engineer, Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission, have been selected as Canadian delegates to the Tokio sectional session of the World's Power Conference to be held in Japan in October. They were nominated at a meeting of Canada's executive conference com-

The steady increase in the use of electric power per capita in Canada is shown by a comparison of the figures for 1920 and 1927. During this period the amount of power used per 100 of population increased from 43 to 63 horse-power, or the use of power per inhabitant increased over 46 per cent.

As an indication of the increasing popularity of Nova Scotia as a tourist resort, the Lord Nelson Hotel. Halifax, on July 15 set three records for meal service with 245 persons sitting down to breakfast, 252 for luncheon, and 270 for dinner.

RADIO SALVES PAIN

Here and There

Another carload of Jersey heifer calves, 36 in number, has been shipped from Lennoxville to New Brunswick for distribution to Chatham and St. Stephen. This makes a total of five cars-162 head of high class Jerseys brought into New Brunswick during the last two months from Quebec.

A fast twenty-foot quarter mile race track built up and surfaced like a good tennis court will be ready for the 40th annual Dominion track and field championships to be held at Banff September 2 next. The infield has been specially prepared and resown and the grand stand enlarged to accommodate four hundred people. The meet in the fall will be the first time the Dominion championships have been held in Alberta since 1922. The Highland Gathering and Scottish Music Festival held every year at Banff, will precede and coincide with the championship meet.

Fourteen hundred Bibles bound in linen with red edges, piled across the front of the stage in the spacious concert room of the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, was the sight that greeted a congregation of over 3,000 people who crowded the big hall of the hotel at a Bible dedication service recently held there. They were for placement in every room of the hotel by the Gideon Association, whose Canadian president, C. W. Stewart, and international president, Samuel Fulton, of Milwaukee, were both present at the function.

A reduction of fifteen per cent. in the acreage planted of seed potatoes in New Brunswick this year as compared with 1928 is noted in the official crop report issued recently by the Soils and Crops Division, New Brunswick Department of Agriculture.

Calgary building records went over the million dollar mark for the month of June when 216 permits were issued for a total value of \$1.106,965. In June, 1928, permits issued numbered 136 to a value of \$688,205.

Record crowds attended the Brandon Exhibition held early in July, and, according to official gate were fifty per cent. greater and thick. Seal in clean, hot jars. than last year, while those at the grand stand were 300 per cent. greater. The livestock entry was the best ever shown, according to many of the old-time visitors.

Have you gotten into a cooking rut? Many women have, and do not realize it. Early in their married life, they learned to cook a certain number of dishes-and for a while they took delight in trying out new ones. The many cares of the household, however put a stop to this and today the dishes are almost the same as those served five, ten or perhaps twenty years ago. It isn't necessary to go to the expense of purchasing a large quantity of cream. Even eggs may why you should buy be eliminated—and cooking as well if you make use of a couple of junket tablets.

Enough vanilla ice-cream to fill a two quart freezer may be made from a quart of milk, half a pint of cream, a cup of sugar, one tablespoon vanilla ,two junket tablets and a tablespoon of cold water-a combination that is surely inexpensive to please the most economical.

Mix milk and cream together and warm to lukewarm, not hot, then add sugar and vanilla. Dissolve junket tablets in the cold water, add to the milk, stir well a moment, then pour immediately into the freezer can, and let stand in a warm room until firmabout twenty minutes. Place can in freezer, pack with ice and salt, and freeze slowly to a thick mush, then finish freezing rapidly.

This dessert is very easy to make lends variety to the menu, requires no eggs and little cream and is thus inexpensive, does not need to be cooked, and is easily digested and yet healthful and nourishing.

It is well worth trying-whether you are in a cooking rut or not.
