### Celebrating Our Country's Victories

On Monday of this week the glad news came to Bobcaygeon that the British and French armies had made extensive gains on the western battle-front. Looking along the main business street of this quiet community, no one would mistake it for any place but rural Canada. Not a flag was to be seen, no one was any more stirred about this great victory than if it had been announced that "there is very little change in the lines."

This attitude is characteristic of Canadians and very few of us can say that we are patriotic in this respect. We might have learned something of this from our American friends, who are not ashamed to display "Old Glory", which stands for much, but nothing to compare with our grand old Union Jack.

During the Boer War, we were always ready to celebrate our victories. Ladysmith and Mafeking were only two of the many victories which were celebrated in these villages by processions of school children and citizens.

This late good news may or may not be the beginning of the Allies' big drive, but at any rate we may look for more important victories from now on, and let us show that we live in a country which is a part of the great empire fighting for liberty and humanity. We in the country scarcely seem as friendly to Britain.

### As To Investments

In the course of reviewing the weeks papers, we came across an interesting criticism in Toronto Saturday Night, a paper which is recognized as strong in criticism of investments. If one is thinking of investing his money and asks the opinion of the Financial Editor of Saturday Night he will receive an honest answer. As the firm mentioned below have opened an office in Sunderland, a town not far away, it is possible that the following will be of interest to our readers.

Tornbury, Ont., August, 1915.

Editor, Gold and Dress:

Will you please give me any information you can re the new town of Weno, just outside of Calgary on the C. N. R. I think it is? I am told it is being worked up as a factory town, eleven factories being there now. The railway station has a different name, but I cannot remember it. The Alberta Financial Brokers own the land, and are selling it in lots, also giving agreements of sale securities at 8 per cent. I wish to know if it is safe investment. I am a widow, and must be careful about investing what money I have.

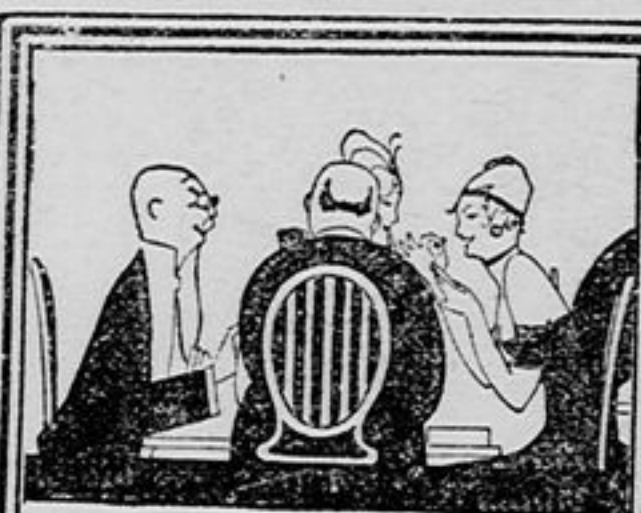

My opinion is that the firm exercises the height of audacity in its programme, and I would advise you to keep away. In the midst of large real estate holdings of acreage, located some miles distant from, and away outside boundaries of, Calgary, Alberta Financial Brokers, Ltd., are slowly developing a settlement, which is all right as far as it goes, but this is mixed up with an attempt to sell to the public of the east lands and lots in connection therewith, also agreements for sale, and I believe also mortgages, all

founded on a handful of industries of small dimensions, the whole being under the jurisdiction of Alberta Financial Brokers, and no one else, so far as I know. I think there is no question but that Alberta Financial Brokers are in the field to dispose of a great number of lots, out of proportion to the number that will comfortably house the employees of the different plants they have secured. One must accept Alberta Financial Brokers valuation on their land, their agreements of sale and their mortgages. I think either the City of Calgary, or some other Saskatchewan department, should look into the matter, and check up what the company is doing. If the location in question had been incorporated as a village or town, it would be under local Government control; its issue of securities to the public would be scrutinized, and held in check. As it is, it is purely a private enterprise. It appears to be such a good thing for Alberta Financial Brokers that they have opened an office at Sunderland, Ont. and have done quite a rousing business in that neighborhood. The face value of all the agreements of sale, mortgages, etc., which have been put out by this company may or may not be greater than the intrinsic value of what backs these securities; there is no method of knowing. Why should eastern money be utilized to develop this tract? Evidently Calgary money thinks it well to fight shy.

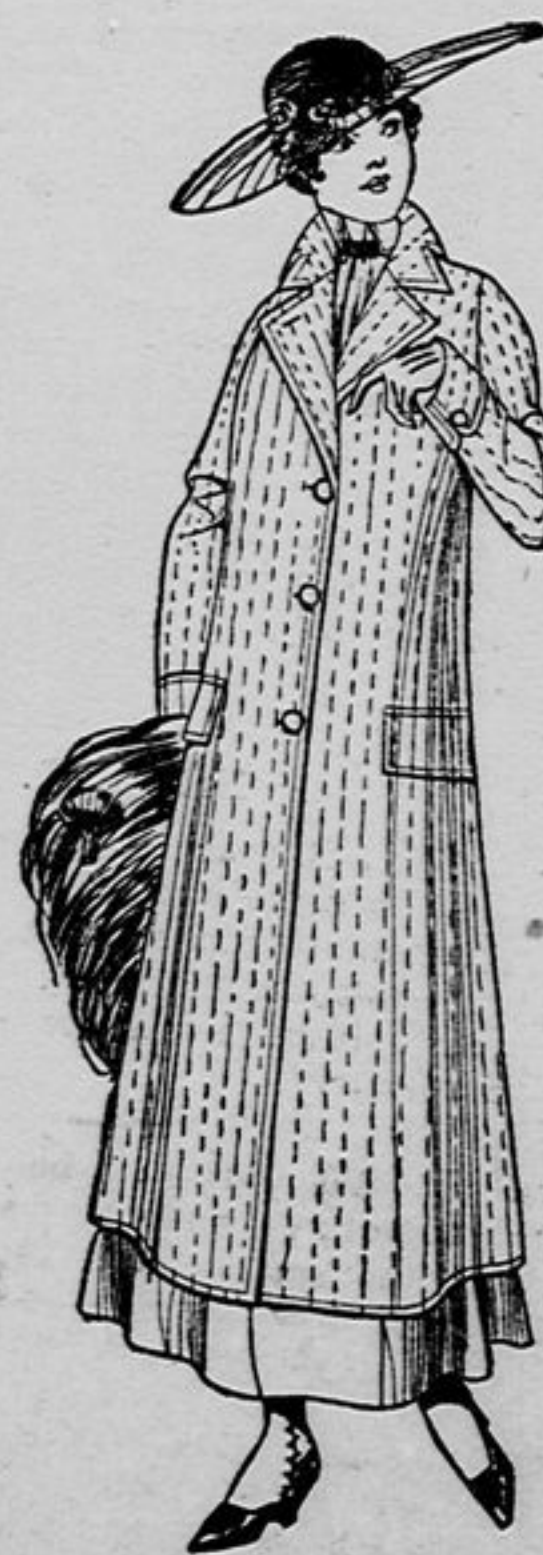
