Trafalgar Day

Banners across the street at different points here proclaimed Thursday, Oct 21st, as Trafalgar Day. On Wednesday and Thursday a canvass was made and \$300 was the mark aimed at. At the time of writing the canvass was promising to be successful. Some of the men who were out collecting reported that they had received contributions all the way from 10c. to \$10 and that a few people were antagonistic to the campaign.

In this appeal from the British Red Cross to Canadian generosity the fact that, as yet, Canadians who are enjoying every freedom, have not made any sacrifices. They, as a nation, have given large sums of money, but where have we at home made our sacrifices? Many homes have sent their boys, and those who are healthy and not fighting must SACRIFICE and GIVE to the Red Cross that the boys may be cared for. It is not enough to give an amount that we will not miss, but we must do without something in order to do what we can in a measure call "our share."

While all of this is true, it is just a little annoying to read from the daily press that the Attorney-General of Great Britain receives a salary of \$100,000 per year, while the workman and merchant are expected to give fifty per cent. of their incomes. The people are not blind. And, right here, things of this nature are having a telling effect on the "giving" of the rural Canadian.

Britain Will Conquer

Britain's Government is robbed by the withdrawal of Sir Edward Carson of at least one member who does not imagine that he could handle the army better than Lord Kitchener or the navy better than Lord Fisher.

The entire assembly of Britain's Lords and Commons, with Lloyd George and a few other noble exceptions, might drop into a hole in the ground and remain there, and the British Empire would still survive.

Britain's strength in this hour is not in the hands of her statesmen, but in the hearts of her stokers. A navy headed by Lord Fisher, an army headed by Lord Kitchener, financed by the leadership of men like Lloyd George, and sustained by the sacrifices of the people, would safeguard the British Empire and ensure victory for the allies despite every temporary dislocation in the machinery of Government at London.—Toronto Telegram.

Is Lord Millner right in his declaration that the British and French troops should be withdrawn from the Peninsula of Gallipoli?

If so, Lord Milner has developed into a military authority since the date of his partial responsibility for the delusion that 50,000 British troops would suffice to carry Redvers Buller to Pretoria by Christmas, 1899

A newspaper heading says that Germany is now engaged in getting nuts for the oil contained in them. There is that fine specimen "nut" the Crown Prince, who has proven himself fairly oily at times.

Health Of Animals

Two Bulletins of premier importance have recently been issued from the Health of Animals branch of the Federal Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, of which Dr. Torrance is the Veterinary Director General. Both can be had free on application to the Publications Branch of the Department. The first, number 17, is entitled

"Enterohepatitis or Black-head in Turkeys". Chas. H. Higgins, B. S. D. V. S. of the Biological Laboratory is the author. While the disease has been known to affect all species of fowl, it is usually seen in its most aggravated and fatal form in turkeys. Dr. Theobald Smith, of the United States Department of Agriculture, made an investigation in Rhode Island during 1894 and 1895, but it was not until 1900 that the first mention was made of it in the Experimental Farms Report of Canada. It has since, however, been repeatedly reported upon in the biological laboratories both at Ottawa and Guelph. Dr. Higgins says that the losses from the disease have been enormous, which supplies excellent reason for a close study of the Bulletin. "The extent of these losses", he further says, "is well indicated by the fact that two decades ago a single small island (Block Island) off the Rhode Island coast, provided two tons of marketable birds each year. Five hundred pounds are not available in the same locality today. Statements are also current that in localities in Ontario where ten carloads were to be had eight years ago it is now difficult to secure two carloads. The reason given by for the falling off in production is the difficulty of rearing stock that can withstand this infection." This quotation is sufficient to indicate the importance of this Bulletin, which treats of the origin and course of the disease and of its prevention and cure. Appropriate plain and coloured illustrations add to the value of the publication.

The second Bulletin numbered 18 has for its title, "Avian Tuberculosis". Dr. Higgins, Pathologist, and A. B. Wickware, V. S., Assistant Pathologist, are the joint authors. It has hardly necessary to allude to the importance of checking and suppressing a disease that affects alike birds, beasts and man. The authors show that the complaint can be transmitted by domestic pets to those who care for them and in the reverse direction. Details of experiments made at the Dominion Biological Laboratory are given in the Bulletin, which also describes the symptoms, steps in prevention that can be taken and remedial treatment that can be applied.

In both Bulletins poultry breeders and all persons interested are invited to send cases to the Biological Laboratory, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, for investigations.

Annual Bible Society Meeting

The annual meeting of the local branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society was held in the Baptist church Thursday evening. The treasurer's report showed collections of \$79 and sales of over \$9. The election of officers resulted in most all being retained in their positions. Mr. Wm. Hickson is the able secretary-treasurer. Rev. T. B. Clarke gave a very able and interesting address on the work of the society. He said in Wales (he is a Welshman) they advertised their meeting for nearly five months, had a union of all the choirs, secured the largest hall and the best speakers and had a rally of all the forces. He advocated an adjourned meeting with that object in view.

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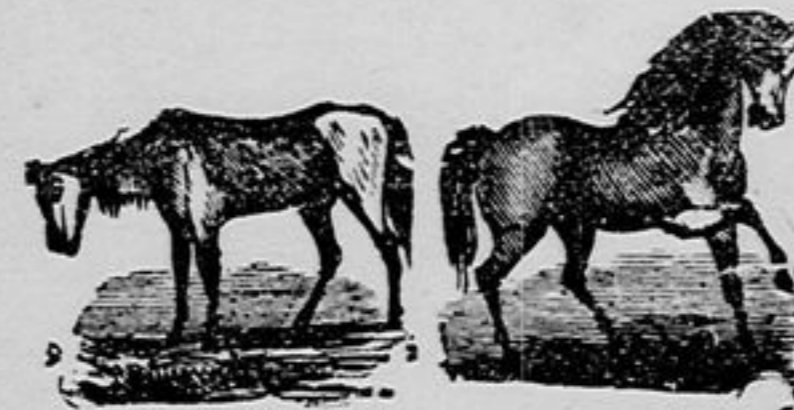
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
