Local Fair Made Record

The best of weather, a record crowd, and a large entry list, including some of the finest stock in the country, contributed to make the Annual Exhibition of the Verulam Agricultural Society, a record breaker. The weather was all that could be desired, and the large crowd thoroughly enjoyed the day. The main building was crowded all afternoon of the second day and the many and varied exhibits received a great deal of attention.

In some classes, the entries were not up to former years, particularly in cut flowers and vegetables, the extremely dry weather being responsible. The Ladies Department, as usual, was one of the principal attractions, and received a great deal of attention.

The baking and home cooking class was filled and the exhibits of a most appetizing nature. Apples were above former years, and made a splendid exhibit.

The exhibits in the different classes of horses, was the best in the history of the Society, both in numbers and quality. One well-known horseman, visiting the fair for the first time, remarked that, this district could take a car load of horses to the Royal and Winter Fair, and win.

The entries in the light horses in harness was not quite up to former years, but was made up by the heavy classes.

The exhibit of sheep, cattle and hogs was exceptionally good. The Boyd Herd of records making a splendid showing. This is the same herd that had been showing at Toronto and Ottawa. A class that had not been filled here for a number of years, was the Jerseys, had a number of entries this year from the herd of Mr. W. F. C. Bert, of Oshawa.

The poultry exhibits this year was very good, some fine birds being shown. The events in the ring and before the Grand Stand attracted a great deal of attention. The trials of speed this year was the best put on for some time.

The Procession, of Decorated Autos, Comic Floats, decorated rigs, hundreds of marching pupis, was something not to be missed at any price, and this year was one of the best.

Taking all in all, the Fair was a wonderful success, and we must not forget those who made this possible. The President, Mr. C. K. Bottum, with his board of Directors and Secretary, are worthy of a great deal of praise for the way the Fair was arranged and managed. It would be unfitting to bring this little sketch to a close without mentioning, our old friend, Billie Batten, of the Stoney Lake Steamer, who run his 25th annual excursion on Saturday to the

Bobcaygeon Fair. May he run many, many more.

The Fair was brought to a close on Saturday night by a concert in the G.W.V.A. Hall, by the Ionic Quartette of Whity, under the auspices of the Agricultural Society, and a real good program was thoroughly enjoyed by all present.
