### COMMERCIAL NOTES.

Toronto Live Stock Market.

The receipts at the cattle market last week were 939 cattle, 254 steers and lambs and 311 hogs. Tuesday 33 loads were received, including 160 sheep and lambs and 200 hogs. There was plenty on the market, and though the demand was good prices were not as firm as last week. There was a drop of \$1 to \$2 a head off butchers' cattle since last week as there was a little too much offered. Six loads were bought for the Montreal market, and seven loads went there in first hands. A couple of good springers were sold at \$42; plenty of poor ones are offered but only good ones are wanted, which sell well. In following representative sales were made: 23 butchers' cattle weighing 1,100 lbs for \$40 a head; 5, weight 1,200, at \$35; a lot of extra choice sold at \$4.00 per cwt; 21, weight 1,077, at \$35; weight 1,000, at \$32; weight 1,100, at \$37; 24, weight 1,000, at \$35. Hogs brought from \$1.40 to \$1.50 for heavy fat. Prices were about the same. Twenty-five lambs, weight about 30 lbs, sold for \$1.25; 27 sheep and lambs, weight 125 lbs, sold for \$5.00; 16 sheep and lambs, weight about 120 lbs, sold for \$5.25; 8 sheep and lambs, weight 100 lbs, for \$5; 90 sheep and lambs, weight 92 lbs, for \$4.50; eight calves sold for \$5.50, which weighed 310 lbs each; 5 calves at \$5, weighing 150 lbs.

### Toronto Street Market.

Receipts of grain to-day were fair and prices unimportant. About 100 bushels of wheat offered and sold at 28c for fall and red, 85c for spring and 65c for roose. Barley steady, with sales of 1,000 bushels at 52c to 57c. Rye steady, with sales of 150 to 180 for 400 bushels. Peas and rye nominal at quotations. Hay quiet, with receipts of thirty loads, which sold slowly at \$7 to \$11 a ton. Straw sold at \$7.50 to \$8; dressed hogs sold at \$9 to \$8.40. - (Globe of Thursday).

Jan. 13 - Spring wheat - Fairly active; 15,000 bush No. 1 hard sold at \$1.56, closed at \$1.66, advance clearing transactions; large orders at \$1.68 to \$1.69; unplaced; 5,000 bush No. 1 northern sold at \$1.53; 10,000 bush do, \$1.52, closing at \$1.53; five cars on track at \$1.60; No. 2 northern, 80c to 97c. Winter wheat - Light offerings; No. 3 extra red sold at 96c; No. 2 red, \$1.00 to \$1.01. - (Globe of Thursday).

### Corn - Quiet; closed easy.

No. 2 yellow sold at 54c; No. 3 do, 54c to 57c; No. 3 corn, 55c; sales aggregated sixteen cars; receipts - 10 cars.

### Oats - Market dull, firm; 3 cars No. 2 white at 51c.

Barley - The demand was active late yesterday afternoon and this morning, and quite a fair amount was disposed of; 40,000 bush Canada and 10,000 bush Michigan were taken at 1c to 2c under the present advance quotations, which asked to-day: No. 2 Canada, 90c; No. 3 extra, 85c to 88c; No. 3 do, 82c to 83c; No. 2 western, 76c; Choice Michigan, 78c to 81c; 100 lbs, 71c to 75c.

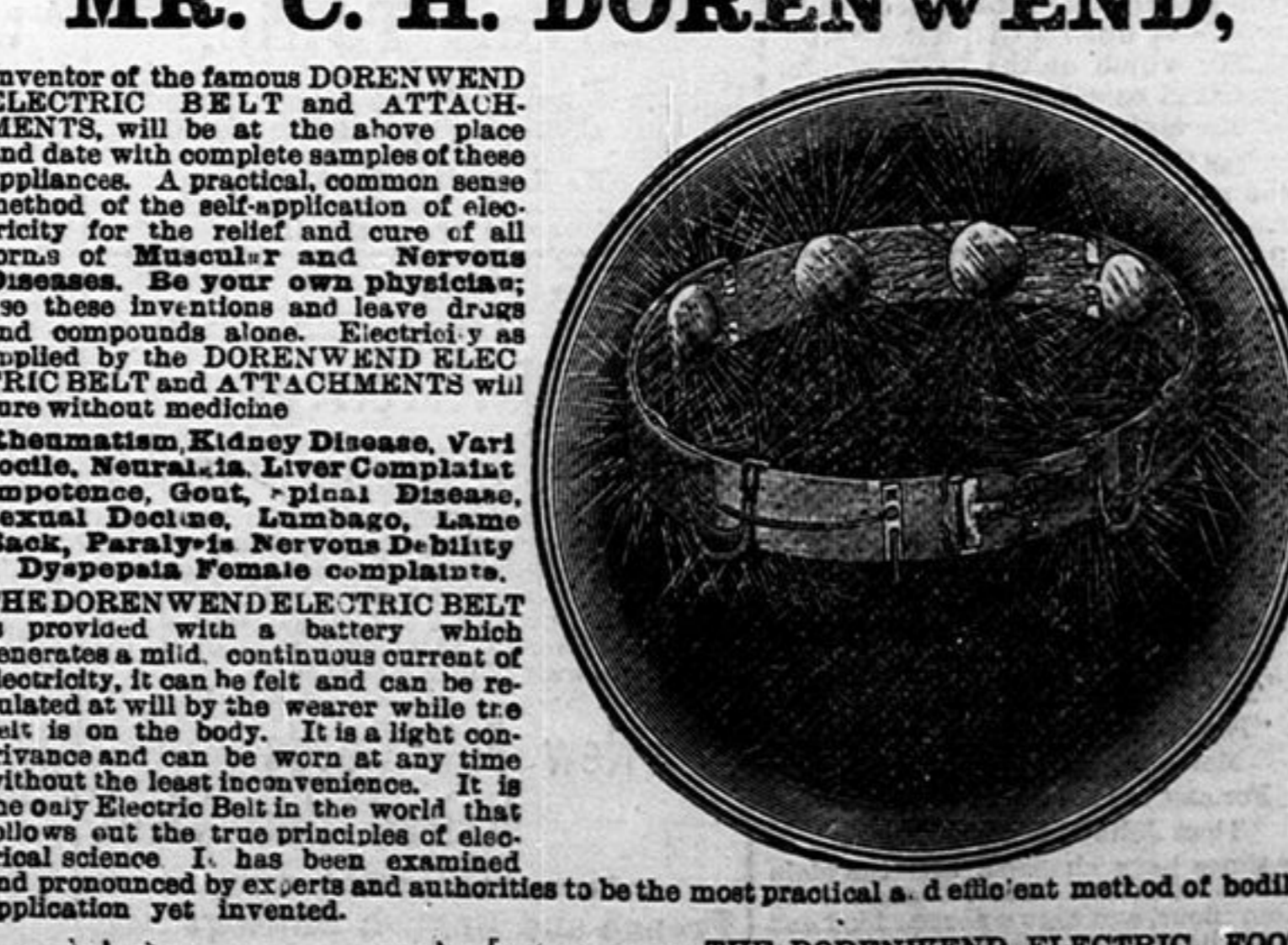
