Mayor Walters here took occasion to make a few remarks, in the course of which he congratulated the members of the council upon their election. Eight of the faces he saw about him had been familiar ones when he last occupied the mayor's chair. Be was pleased to see how punctual they had all been that evening, and hoped they would keep the practice up. He would like the committees to appoint regular nights for meeting; some of them were rather unwieldy, and if his advice in favor of small committees had been taken he thought it would have been better—it was always difficult to get a quorum. One important matter that would engage the attention of the council in the near future was the question of waterworks. He also hoped that the reeves would carefully look into a matter that had been given considerable space in one of the town papers—that of a county refuge. He would not say whether he thought such an institution necessary,—it would be the duty of the reeves to carefully consider the question.
