1 4.—That he is a resident within the said electoral district and derives an income of at least \$300 annually from his earnings as follows, \$150 money, \$150 in board etc., as a laborer, and has so derived such income and has been a resident of Canada for one year next before the date of

this application.

At the court for the revision of the voters' lists held at Coboconk the name of Bethel Robman was struck off, he being only about eighteen years of age. There were four others struck off at the same court for being under the age of twentyone, and each of these were put on by declaration was false. There were in North Victoria altogether some 600 or 700 auch eclarations made. They were not made fifty declarations. In each declaration the party declared to his own personal knowledge. Upon the revision of the lists a very large proportion of these declarations were found to be false, in fact, and the parties who made the declarations admitted on examination that they had no personal knowledge of the matters as to which they declared, so that nearly the whole of the declarations were false to the extent that the man who deciared he knew of his own personal knowledge had no personal

knowledge of the matter, It would probably be harsh to say that these people knew that what they were declaring to was untrue, but it is certain that they did undertake to make solemn declarations as to things that they did not know to be true. 
