One of the best county poor houses in Ontario is the one recently built in the County of Oxford, near the town of county, complete, was \$30,868, less the Government grant of \$4,000.

In the United States nearly every county has a county poor house. In the State of Ohio, for instance, there is a poorhouse in each one of its 88 counties. In the State of New York, with only four exceptions, every county has a poorhouse. In this State the poorhouses are under the supervision of a State Board, and this board now favors the adoption of the cottage system in the construction of county poor-houses. The cottage system is more expensive than the congregate system, but it is claimed that it is much safer in case of fire, it prevents the spread of contagious diseases,

To the east of the keeper's cottage is the cottage for the women. These buildings are 20 or 30 feet apart and they are connected by means of a covered passage. To the north of the keeper's residence, but connected therewith by a covered passage, is the general kitchen and two dining-rooms, one for men and one for women. The cottages are two stories only. Over the lining-rooms is the chapel and over the kitchen are bedrooms for attendants. For the accommodation of sick inmates t is recommended to have two one-story cottages, one to the west of the men's cottage for the men, and one to the east The barn and cottage for the men

of the women's cottage for the women. are located on the same side of the keeper's residence so as to keep the men at all times as far as possible from the women's department. The morality of many of the inmates of houses of refuge is very low indeed and every precaution must be taken to keep the two sexes absolutely separated. This separation is much better effected by the cottage system than by the ordinary congregate system. The cottage sysem, moreover, is much safer in case of fire ; it is safer in case of an epidemic; it is more homelike and removes the objection that many have to the ordinary poor-house; the cottages have more sun light and are more easily ventilated than the rooms of a large build-
