The President's Address and Treasurer's Financial Statement—Election of New Officers and Directors—A Short Business Session.

A short meeting of the officers and directors of the South Victoria Agricultural Society for 1895 was held in the central hall on Wednesday last at 1 p.m.

The president, Mr. Bryan, occupied the chair and read the following address:

Gentlemen, We, the president and directors of the South Victoria Agricultural Society, beg to report that we have had a very successful year. We had the largest number of entries that we ever had at a Central fair in Lindsay.

We had a splendid display of horses, cattle, sheep and swine and in fact every line of husbandry was well represented at the fair this year.

We had more people pass through the gates on our little day than ever passed through them before in one day. We were highly complimented by the members of the Dominion K.C.M.G. to open our exhibition on the second day, and there were representatives present from nearly every part of the province.

Owing to the late season of late receipts we were enabled to pay a very large prize to the exhibitor of the best pair of calves, and our interest on grounds, therefore reducing the mortgages held by the Midland Loan and Savings Company, return our sincere thanks to the county council for their liberal annual grant to the society.

We are also indebted to the members of the county who so nobly assisted in carrying out our year's work, and to the exhibitors who still go on hope that the year will be one of the most successful in our history.

In closing our report we desire to express the hope that the directors will have the support of every man in the county.
