Winnipeg Grand Opera House Destroyed-Two other Serious Fires on Sunday in the Prairie City.

Winnipeg, Jan. 17.-(Special.)-The Winnipeg firemen were kept busy on Sunday, several serious fires engaging their attention. About 2 o'clock Sunday morning the Grand Opera House, on South Main-street, was discovered in flames, and within a few hours the theatre and entire block in which it was situated were totally destroyed, scarcely a dollar's worth of stuff being saved. The theatre was only opened a couple of months ago, Seach and Sharp being its proprietors. It was formerly known as Wesley Hall block, and was owned by Mr. McNaught, solicitor of the Northern Pacific Railway. It adjoins the handsome Hotel Manitoba, and that place had a narrow escape, the interior being flooded with water to save it. Under the theatre were three stores: Pangally & Ford, W. R. Richardson and Charles Lacey. all three being in the upholstering business. They lost everything. How the fire started is a mystery. The loss is about \$40,000. The second fire was at Dawson's

fruit and confectionery store, North Main-street, and this place was also completely destroyed. A third fire occurred at 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon and was at the Assiniboine Tenement block, a handsome structure just erected over the ashes of the Cauchon block. The two-storey annex of the Assiniboine block was destroyed, but the main portion was saved, though all the tenants lose heavily by smoke and

thall be Reported From Either Country-When Disease is Found Ninety Days' Quarantine Will be Enforced-Herses for Racing or Show to Go in on inspection.

Washington, Jan. 16 .- The agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the Canadian Minister of Agriculture relating to quarantine of animals between the United States and Canada provides that:

1. Each country shall adopt the veterinary certificates of the other. 2. That the chief of the bureau of animal industry and the chief inspector of stock for Canada will mutually inform one another of contugious animal diseases in either country, or of disease in animals imported from either country.

3. A 90-day quarantine shall be enforced by both countries upon all sattle imported from Europe or from any country in which contagious pleuro-pneumonia is known to exist; a 15-day quarantine shall be enforced upon all ruminants and swine imported from countries in which footand-mouth disease exists, within six months, and upon all swing imported from other countries. Breeding cattle admitted into this country must be accompanied by a certificate that they have been subjected to the tuberculing test and

found free from tuberculosis, 6therwise they shall be detained in quarantine one week and subjected to the tuberculine test. All cattle found tuberculosic must be returned to the country whence shipped or slaughtered without compensation. Cattle for feeding or stocking ranches must be accompanied by a certificate showing that they are free from any contagious disease, and that (excepting tuberculosis) no such disease exists in the district whence they came. Cattle in transit will be admitted at any port of the United States and Canada in bond, for exportation by sea from any Canadian port or from Portland, Boston and New Yo.k in the United States. No animals covered by this memorandum may be placed on board cars till the litter from previous loads has been removed and the car thoroughly cleaned and disinfected. Inspectors may cause such work to be done at the expense of the railroad company or prohibit the use of the cars until it is done. Sheep may be admitted subject to inspection at port of entry and ac-

companied by official certificate that sheep scab has not existed in the returned or slaughtered. Sheep may be admitted for transit in bond from one port to another in either country, and if for slaughter they may be admitted without inspection. Subject to inspection at shipping port, they may be admitted into either country for transit to any shipping port in Canada for export by sea, or to the United States for export from Portland, Boston and New York. Swine may be admitted without inspection for slaughter in bonded cars to bonded slaughter nouses or when forming part of settlers' effects and accompanied by a certificate that swine plague or hog cholera has not existed within six months in the district whence they came. Lacking such certificate they must be inspected at port of entry, and if diseased will be slaughtered without compen-

Horses may be admitted in from one port to another in either country without inspection at the shipping port. Horses may be admitted for racing, show or breeding purposes on inspection at port of entry. Horses may be admitted for temporary stay, teaming or pleasure driving at points along the frontler for a period not exceeding one week on port of entry upon permit of Customs officer. Should he observe any evidence of disease he will detain the animals and report to the district inspector, who will decide whether the animals may be admitted, and horses used for driving or riding to or from points in Manitoba, Northwest Territories or British Columbia, on bustness connected with stock raising or Indian tribes may be admitted without inspection, but must report to Customs officers both going and coming. Under all other circumstances horses must be inspected at port of
