OUR INLAND WATERS.

We understand that Capt. Geo. Crandell, on behalf of the steamboat owners and lumbermen of this district, is circulating a couple of petitions to be transmitted to the Hon. G. W. Blair, minister of railways and canals, calling the attention of the Dominion government to the pressing necessity of extensive improvements to navigation at Bobcaygeon, Rosedale, and Lindsay, in order that the full benefits of our magnificent stretch of inland waters may be enjoyed. As a first step, the lock at Bobcaygeon, must be rebuilt, and necessary repairs made to the canal and dam to prevent waste of water, in order that cur boatmen and lumbermen may have uninterrupted access to the lower chain of waters emptying out of Pigeon lake.

Another important work referred to in the memorial is the enlargement of the lock at Rosedale, which taps the northern chain of lakes, and through which steamers and barges will have to pass to gain entrance to the Balsam lake section of the Trent Valley canal, now under construction. For some time past a force of men in the employ of the Deminion government have been engaged in blasting and clearing a channel above the lock, but until the lock chamber is made the standard size, steamers plying on the lower of the improvements already under way | twelve days on board the steamers, and if and projected.

GONE UP IN SMOKE.

A \$75,000 FIRE IN PETERBORO WEDNESDAY MORNING.

The Consolidated Milling Property Destroyed-The Origin of the Fire Is Unknown. [Special to THE POST.]



Tuesday night fire the large frame mill operated by the Consolidated Milling Co. When the alarm was first sent in smoke was pouring from the windows and doors, but before the firemen arrived on the scene
