MUNICIPAL REPRESENTATION. What is the Right Method ?- Defects of the Ward System-Publication of

Assessments. We quote the following interesting extract from the election address of a Toronto candidate for election as alderman, because it sets out foundation principles which apply to municipal government everywhere, and is well worth thinking Devoting His Energies

"I advocate proportional representation in the election of aldermen (and municipal counciliors generally) because it is the key to good municipal government. We live aldermen ought to be the best men in the city, freely elected in such a way as to represent the best thought of the people. So they would be if our method of voting were right. But our method of voting is wrong. The whole fabric of city government rests primarily on the vote of the ment rests primarily on the vote of the people; therefore a right method of voting is the absolutely necessary foundation for

good government. MULTIPLE VOTING. Our present stupid system divides the city by arbitrary ward boundaries, so as to prevent like-minded men in different wards from uniting in the choice of a man who would really represent their views. Then it mixes and muddles things by giving to each elector four votes; so that instead of your being represented by one man in the city council, you have only, so to speak, a one-fourth interest in four different aldermen, who can not really represent your views and ideas. This also causes candidates to straddle on questions that they would otherwise be straight on, prevents the best men from seeking election, and causes the people to lose interest in city matters, because they are not interested in the men who are elected.

Again, persons owning property in more than one ward have now the unfair advan tage to vote more than once at the same election. Would you support a measure allowing a man to vote six times at the same election because he bad six propernot. Taen why should he vote six times because the properties happen to be in different wards? THE SINGLE VOTE.

Here is the right principal: Twenty-four aldermen are to be elected, and the average vote is something under 24,000. Taking for convenience the round figure of 24,000, and dividing that by the number of aldermen to be elected, we find that there are about a thousand voters to each alderman. Therefore our voting system should be such that any thousand voters scattered throughout the city could unite in the selection of an alderman to represent them. A thousand wholesale merchants and business men all over the city desire to elect a prominent financial man without his having to canvass. Let them do it. A thousand workingmen all over the city want an alderman of their own choosing Let them have him. This would be real representation; and aldermen so chosen would not be of mere ward reputation, but would necessarily be men known throughout the whole city.

The method is simple. Abolish the wards; abolish the quadruple vote; and let each voter "plump" by a single vote for the one man he wants to represent him in the city council. To this foundation may be added the Hare-Spence or the Gove system; but I have not space here

to deal with details. Those who have studied the question know well that proportional representation in the election of aldermen would promote municipal reform, abolish the ward heeler, awaken a strong and healthy icterest in municipal matters, bring the best men to the front, and give us a real representation of the people.

Hon. Mr. Mulock in the Matter of Mail Contracts.

Contracts Let to the Lowest Tenderers Regardless of Politics-Project for Quick Transit to the Old Country-From 8t John's to Ireland in Half a Week, Ottawa, Jan. 18.—(Special.)—During

the absence of the Postmaster-General from Ottawa there will be a suspension of the work of renewing postal contracts, upon which Mr. Mulock has been engaged for several weeks. The contracts which have without tender. Mr. Mulock has let new contracts invariably to the lowest tenderer, provided the sureties were good. The politics of the tenderer has not been taken into consideration. A good story is told of the way in which he received the deputation which waited upon the Government the other day to ask for an increased mail subsidy for the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway. The plea put forward by the deputation was that this was a colonization road and that therefore, in the interests of colonization, the increased subsidy should be given. It is said the Postmaster-General tilted himself back in his chair and very quietly informed the deputation that under those circumstances they had made a mistake, and had come to the

"What do you mean?" ejaculated "Why, this is not the Colonization Department," replied the Postmaster-General. "If you want to encourage colonization you must see the Minister of the Interior."

The deputation had to be content with this reply, and went away wondering what sort of a man the Premier, who happened to be present, had chosen for a colleague. When Mr. Schreiber, Chief Engineer and Deputy Minister of Railways and

Canals, was in New York last week he was waited upon by Mr. R. G. Reid, who has nearly completed the Newfoundland Railway from St. John's to Port Au Basque, on the west coast. Mr. Reid has just returned from England, where he has placed the contract for a fine steamer, which is to run from Port Au Basque to Sydney, were it will connect with the Cape Breton Railway. Mr. Reid's object in interviewing Mr. Schreiber was for the purpose of providing for close connections between the steamer and the railway. Mr. Reid's contract with the ship-

builders calls for a first-class, high speed, screw steamer, 230 feet in length with 32 feet beam, at a cost of \$260,000. The steamer will make three round trips per week between the two points. This will be the first fruition of many schemes for shortening transatlantic travel. When the Intercolonial Railway was built it was intended to connect at Miramichi, N.B., by steamer with Western Newfoundland. From St. John's, Nfid., to Ireland the distance

is about 1600 miles, which would be accomplished, at the rate of 20 knots, in 83 hours, or three days and a half. The Intercolonial scheme of fast steamers from Miramichi to Newfoundland was never consummated, but early next June, when the Newfoundland Railway has been completed and the new steamer placed on the route between its western terminus and North Sydney, the shortening of the ocean voyage by at least three days will be an accomplished fact. Some idea of the importance of North Sydney as a port of shipping may be gathered from the Harbor Commissioner's report for 1896, which shows that during the season of navigation 2166 vessels arrived there, representing a capacity of 762,-000 tons. Of these 625 were ocean steamers of a capacity of 618,800 tons. Mr. Justice Burbidge delivered judgment in the case of the Queen v. St. Louis. The object in view in this distribution has been to add to the productiveness and improve the quality of these important agricultural products throughout the country by placing within reach of every farmer pure seed of the most vigorous and productive sorts. This work has met with much appreciation and and a con-

siderable degree of success. Instructions have been given by the hon. minister of agriculture to make a similar distribution this season. Owing to the very large number of applications now received it is not practicable to send more than one sample to each applicant, but with this limitation it is hoped that the stock available will be sufficient to permit of every farmer who so desires sharing in the benefits of this useful branch of the

work of the Experimental Farms. The distribution now in progress consists of some of the most promising sorts of oats, barley, spring wheat, field corn and potatoes. Requests for samples may be sent to the Cantral Esperimental Farm. Ottawa, at any time before the 1st of March, but after that date the lists will be closed so that the applications then on hard may be filled before seeding begins.
All communications can be sent free of postage. It is desirable that each applicant should name the variety which he desires to test, also one or two alternative sorts in case the stock of the sort chosen should be exhausted; while no promise can be made that the variety asked for will be sent, the wishes of correspondents will be attended to as far as practicable. The samples of grain will be sent early,
