Therefore, at the next election, the two cities of Tasman's will elect their parliamentary representatives by Proportional Representation.

"This is a great step in advance, is the first adoption of the principle of parliamentary election by a British-speak ing people. The working of this object lesson will be eagerly watched by the increasing number of men and women who are interested in electoral justice and fair play, and who know that the root of many political evils is in the faulty method which invites and encourages wrong

The Ottawa Journal refers to the comparative statistics of drunkenness in Maine under prohibition, and Canada under license. According to the figures given "during 1896 the total number of persons imprisoned in the jails of Maine was 6,105. Of this total, 3,049, or nearly half, were committed for drunkenness.' The latest book of "Criminal Statistics" for Canada, however, gives the total number of convictions for indictable and summary offences in 1895 for the whole Dominion as 37,585, of which 11,558 were for drunkenness-much less than one-third. Maine has probably about 800,000 population, a little over oneeighth that of the Dominion, yet it had little less than one-sixth the number of imprisonments, and less than one-fourth the cases of drunkenness. As the figures stand there was in Maine one conviction every 114 of the population, one-half of the convictions being for drunkenness Canada there was one conviction every 135 of the population, and onl one-third of these convictions were for drunkenness. The showing is not discouraging one for Canadians.

This needed requirement has already been far too lorg delayed, and it is not creditable to the fine county of Victoria that numbers of the poor and homeless are left to shift as best they can, to find food, shelter or employment. Fifty or sixty acres of good land, as the law requires, can be easily and cheaply obtained, suitable buildings erected, and the entire cost would be scarcely felt by a generous and humane community: besides, the Ontario government will give a grant or pay a liberal proportion of the entire cost. A poor man or a poor woman finding work and a home in such an insti tution will not feel that he or she is an actual pauper, and be free to a certain extent from the humiliating feeling of being dependent solely on charity. Other counties in Canada have already provided such homes for the destitute, and, better still, sufficient crops have been grown to pay, or nearly pay, all expenses connected with the Refuge. No more excuses should be made. The duty to find such a home and employment for the needy is impera-tive, and it is to be hoped that our new county council will in this respect prove themselves far in advance of their municipal predecessors.-Yours. The South Ward Snow Plow

ITo the Editor of Tun Post ! Sin,-Will you kindly permit me through the columns of your valuable paper, to call the attention of our "city fathers" to the slovenly manner in which the snew plaw work is being done in the eastern portion of the south ward,

Yesterday morning apparently the plow was at work early, but to the best of my knowledge was not out again. By nine o'alcok Russell and Ridout streets were badly drifted, considering the small amount of snow that has fallen so far this season.
As a result of the plow not being at work throughout the day the snow, where drifted on the walk has been packed hard by pedestrians, and although the plow has been at work again this morning, the work done is positively bad, the snow being several inches in dep!h where it had drifted and been packed.

This is a repetition of last year's disgraceful work and should not be permitted. The contractor should be immediately ordered to remove this snow by means of a shovel, if necessary, as it is the result of his own neglect. If such work is allowed to continue our walks will be in a pitiable condition by the time spring weather has set in. There are numbers of persons who will undertake this work, and who will at least endeavor to do it properly.

I contend that during such weather as we had yesterday the plow should be constantly at work. If we are paying insufficiently for this purpose, the amount should be increased and the contract given the most reliable party offering to do the work for some stated sum. There is no other expenditure made by the town that is more satisfactory to the public than that spent in removing the snow from the sidewalks when properly done, and no other that is less satisfactory when the work is permitted to be scamped.
