A VERY COLD WAVE Prevails All Over the Continent Just Now. WINTER WEATHER IN ENGLAND, TOO. Mercury Has Dropped Lower in the West—on States than at Any Time for Two Years—Fifty Degrees Below Zero at Medicine Hat—Frost Everywhere.

IN THE OLD LAND. Interruption to Travel in England and Many Other Inconveniences. London, Jan. 24.—The snowstorm which began on Friday continues and is causing many interruptions to travel and other inconveniences. Many of the trains have been stopped, and the losses sustained by farmers and others will be quite heavy. The snow is so deep between Hastings and Brighton that a number of trains have been blocked, an occurrence which is seldom heard of in that part of the country. The heavy wind which accompanied the snowstorm has done considerable damage along the coast. Some of the fishing boats which have arrived at Lowestoft report the loss by drowning of several members of their crews. A number of boats were quite badly damaged. Quantities of wreckage are being washed ashore on the Norfolk coast, indicating the loss of some vessel or vessels at sea.
