did not intend to initiate a system of sew-erage, the Kent-st. drain, at least, should be repaired and fitted with flush-tanks; the rush of a couple of hundred gallons of water in a solid body would carry away even brick-bats, and would effectually prevent the lodgment of sewage entering the drain. It was fairly well understood that p lay-voults were emplying into the drain, and if not taken to the river the deposits would produce foul geses and possible disease.

Coun. So THERAN thought the medical health offine's report should come before them adopted by the board-if the council began a system of sewers they would need all the support possible. He then moved, and Coup. PEDLAR seconded, a resolution to refer the report back.

Attention was then directed to the M. H. O.'s recommendation that a public disinfector be appointed. Dr. McAlpine said such an appointment was essentially necessary, as in several cases where the work of disinfecting after contageous diseases had been left to the owner or occupant of the premises it had been poorly done, the result being a second outbreak. He could say, however, that no recurrence of disease had ever been noted when Sanitary Inspector Douglas had charge, but Dr. Bryce, of the provincial board of health, had expressed the opinion that it was il-

legal for him to perform such duties. Coun. Sootheran again expressed his opinion that the report should be sent back to the board ; if the recommendations therein were endorsed he was positive that the council would deal with them in a serious spirit, and might possibly arrange to spend more money on sewers during the coming summer than was at present contemplated.


