SENATE REFORM.

The question of Senate Reform has been brought into prominence again by Sir Wilfrid Laurier's reference to it in his recent address at a Montreal liberal demonstration. The Premier declares that he is not in favor of the abolition of the senate, and states weighty objections to that proposed remedy. So far as the present is concerned the situation has become intolerable. The tory majority in that body does not deliberate; it simply registers the decrees of the leader of the tory opposition. The government of the day has a very large popular majority; it has a very large majority in the House of Commons; but the tory majority in the Senate is ready at a moment's notice to defeat and reject government measures, simply because they are the measures of a liberal government. It is a part of the tory tactics at Ottawa to make the utmost use of the tory majority in the senate to embarrass the liberal government. and to defeat its measures. That is extreme. When there was a tory government in power the reverse was the case so far as the senate was concerned. The senate passed their measures at 2.40 speed. For this peculiar featand Death may bring. This plan, too, if it had been adhered to would no doubt have resulted in a higher standard of appointments. But Sir John Macdonald made an early departure from the high ideal set up at opening of confederation, and senatorships became the distinguishing reward for his most devoted party supporters. The
