> > KILLED AT A FUNERAL

County Treasurer Cowan, His Son and Man the Victims.

Ottawa, Jan. 9 .- A deplorable calam ity happened on Saturday during the funeral of Mr. Charles O'Gara, and two more funerals will shortly follow. Amongst the numerous rigs present was a sleigh containing Mr. Cowan, the county treasurer, his son, Mr. Holmes Cowan, and a driver called St. Germain. As the funeral cortege started the horses became unmanageable and bolted on to the Canada Atlantic and Ottawa, Arnprior & Parry Sound Railway tracks. Before the driver could recover command of his horses the outgoing Parry Sound train swept round a sharp curve, dashing into the sleigh at full speed. County Treasuer Cowan was killed immediately, and Mr. Holmes Cowan only survived his father for a few minutes. St. Germain, terribly injured, was removed in the ambulance to St. Luke's Hospital, only to die soon after entering. Both the horses were killed. Mr. Cowan, sr., leaves a family of daughters and Mr. Holmes Cowan a widow and one daughter. Mr. Holmes Cowan was a brother-in-law of Hon. N. C. Wallace of Woodbridge, Mrs. Cowan being a sister of Mrs. Wallace. Mr. Cowan made his last will on Fri-

day. Owing to the approaching marriage of his daughter, Miss Maggie Cowan, he found it necessary to add a codicil, and had it witnessed by Mr. Charles McNab, county clerk and Mr. John Dawson, Court House custodian. Mr. Cowan remarked that he had changed his will many times, but that would be the last. Team Ran Into the Train.




