EAST VICTORIA TEACHERS' CONVENTION.

The annual meeting of the teachers of East Victoria was held in Lindsay on Thursday and Friday, Feb. 5th and 6th. Gwing to the absence of the president on the morning of the first day Mr. Hallet took the chair. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted. A report of the township convention held at Kinmount convention. A committee was then appointed to nominate the officers of the association for the ensuing year. A second committee was ap-pointed to consider the advisability of holding pointed to consider the advisability of holding township conventions. There being no other items of business. Miss Armour was called upon to take her subject English literature with the third class, which she dealt with in a manner most satisfactory to all. Each thought of the passage was impressed by means of illustrations easily grasped by the pupils. Mr. W. Hickson of Bubcaygeon, the president, having arrived during the course of the morning's pro-ceedings, now took his place as chairman, and gave a short address, in which he dwelt on the mental and physical qualifications of the teacher, showing that he should have a sound mind and a sound body.

In the afternoon session Mr. J. J. Tilley of Toronto gave a lecture on the Principles of Education, in which he laid down four great principles which should serve as a guide to every one
who attempts to teach. Ist—That mind and
body are interdependent. 2nd—That faculty of
all kinds grows only by exercise. 3rd—That
perfection of act, either mental or physical, is mly reached by repetition. 4th-That activity stimulates the acquisition of knowledge. When these were fully discussed the lecturer pointed out some of nature's methods of education, showing that she never formulated rules or forced her pupils to give attention, but first

furnished faculty, then material to act on, and last, occasion for the use of faculty.

After a lengthy discussion on several points of the lecture, Mr. Knight spoke for a short time on the subject of uniform promotion examinations, but owing to lateness of the even-ing further discussion of this important subject was left over.

In the evening Mr. Tilley delivered a mos interesting lecture to a large and appreciative audience in the assembly hall of the collegiate institute. The subject of the lecture was "Success in Life," which was defined as "making the best of oneself," and in dealing with it the lecturer pointed out four special conditions of success. Taking as his first the observance of the law of labor, he showed that the vast ma-jority of the failures in the world were due to the neglect of this law. He attributed the fall of nations such as Rome, the backward state of civilization in some countries as compared with civilization in some countries as compared with that of others possessing no more advantages, and even the strikes among the working classes of to-day, to the idleness of all or some classes of the people. As his second heading he showed that perseverance or a firm resolve to succeed was absolutely necessary to success. In illustrating this point he referred to such men as Scott, Stephenson and Watt, who are famous for the success they achieved solely by persevering effort. As he continued he urged upon vering effort. As he continued he urged upon his audience, and especially the young men, a third condition, that of self-reliance, showing clearly and forcibly that aid received from withly lessened by having to attend to the reaping of the fruit or harvest of those wild oats. A marked impression was made upon the audience and they dispersed feeling that they had enjoy-

In the Friday morning session Miss Lang read a paper on the systems of teaching reading to junior pupils, showing the superiority of the phonic method over the others. Lang was loudly applauded for the way in

morning in exemplifying his method of teaching grammar to junior class. As the lesson was being taught he clearly showed young pupils could get a knowledge of grammar without acquiring such dislike for its study as is present

in the minds of many pupils.
