On Monday there arrived at the California Fig Syrup Co. Falls a car-load of machinery needed to connect the sawmill with the new planing mill and box factory by means of a steel will transmit power from the sawmill to the other building, which will contain the following machines, an order for which has already been placed in Boston :- One 30 inch six-roll double planer, two 15-inch double planers and matchers, one 10-inch moulding machine, one 10-inch swing cutoff saw, and one band resaw, which will split any lumber not more than a yard wide into boards as thin as may be required. The new building is practically finished, and when the weather grows warm enough will be painted red outside and white within, and farnished with forty-six windows similar to those in the sawmill. The factory measures 104 x 96 feet, and is three stories high, and the ground floor is divided into five passages like narrow streets, through three of which-one on the north side and two on the south-railway tracks are laid. It is thought that the new machinery will all be in place and ready to start by the middle of March, but the sawmill cannot, of course, be set going until some of the 200,000 logs being banked on Burnt river which employ fully 500 men and 450 horses, all but about 50 of which belong to the firm, the others being hired.
