DEATH OF MR. L. S. LUNDY.

Was a Grandson of William Lundy, After Whom the Historic Lane Was Named.

Niagara Falls, Feb. 9.-The Niagara

district has lost one of its best-known and highly respected citizens in the death of Mr. Lanty Shannon Lundy of Lundy's Lane, yesterday evening. He was the last surviving member of the family of Thos. Lundy, a son of William Lundy, a U.E. Loyalist, after whom the historic lane was named. The late Mr. Lundy was born and spent most of his life in the house in which he died, and which was used as a hospital during the Battle of Lundy's Lane, and as officers' quarters during 1814, his father's house having been burned by guerillas in 1813, The original plot of the homestead was granted by King George III., Jan. 6, 1796, thus having been in the unbroken possession of the family for more than a hundred years, and the clock, whose ticking marked his birth, marked also his release from the weary hours of his suffering, during which he was sustained by an unwavering Christian faith. He was also of revolutionary stock, his maternal grandfather having been Col. Shannon, a British officel, whose command was the last to surrender to American arms. He had entered upon his 77th year, having been born Jan. 1, 1820. He had been a life-long Liberal, a justice of the peace for 33 years, and had held many other public positions of trust. He was esteemed by all for his uprightness of character, and kindness of heart, and revered by those admitted to his friendship and home circle. He leaves a sorrowing widow and large grownup family, by whom he was dearly loved and by whom his memory will be held as their best possession. The funeral will take place from his late residence or Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 12, at o'clock, interment taking place at Drummond Hill Cemetery. WIRED FROM WINNIPEG.

TAKES NERVE TO SUICIDE.

And for That Reason Probably Embezzler Fischer Returned to New York and Broke Into Jall.

Toronto, Feb. 8. Herbert Fischer, bookkeper in Paterson's box factory. New York, has surrender himself as an embezzler. Since Jan. 27, Fischer has not been at the factory, Two days later, under the name of "H. Schuberg, Jersey City," he registered at the Albion Hotel, Toronto. On Monday night he paid his bill and left the hotel telling the clerk that he was going to Quebec and Montreal, Instead he went back to New York and gave himself up to the police, who were looking for him. It seems that while in Toronto he contemplated suicide. With that idea in view, he bougt a revolver and indited this brief note, which was found in his

pocket, when arrested: "Albion Hotel, Toronto, Jan. 30. "To whom it may concern: "In case any mishap should befall the bearer of this, H. Fischer of New York, corner Webster-avenue and 171st street, please notify my wife Augusta, of same address, and send telegram at once. Any property found upon me. also all personal property in flat at above address belongs to my wife. I

Training School for Ottawa. Arrangements have been made by the education department for the establishment of a training school for French and English teachers in Ottawa. The principal of the school will be attached to the Normal school steff, and the schools of the city will be used for practice purposes. The amount puld for the maintenance of the school will be the same as paid in the counties of Prescott and Russell, It is expected that the school will be used for the supply of trained teachers for Ottawa and the adjacent countles.
