


Coun. Thurston said that before the

public meeting was called the council should know whether the company intended to locate inside the corporation or not—
if they went outside there would be little use talking about a bonus of any amount.

Dep.-reeve Keith was of opinion that a meeting should be held. Coun. Jas. GRAHAM said it was pretty well understood when Mr. Peuchin was here that the town would be unable to give a cash bonus, but it was hoped that by an arrangement with Ops and the G.
T. R. the town would be able to offer advantages equivalent to such a bonus. If
the council could see no other way to

secure the industry than by giving \$5,000 in cash the lookout was a poor one, but if by a little push and enterprise they could gain the advantages mentioned it would be worth while making the effort. It had been said by some business men that the company did not intend coming here any way, and that any money spent by the council in developing the scheme would be thrown away. In that case he would favor asking Mr. Peuchin to deposit the sum of \$100 to pay the town's costs in case the scheme fell through.
