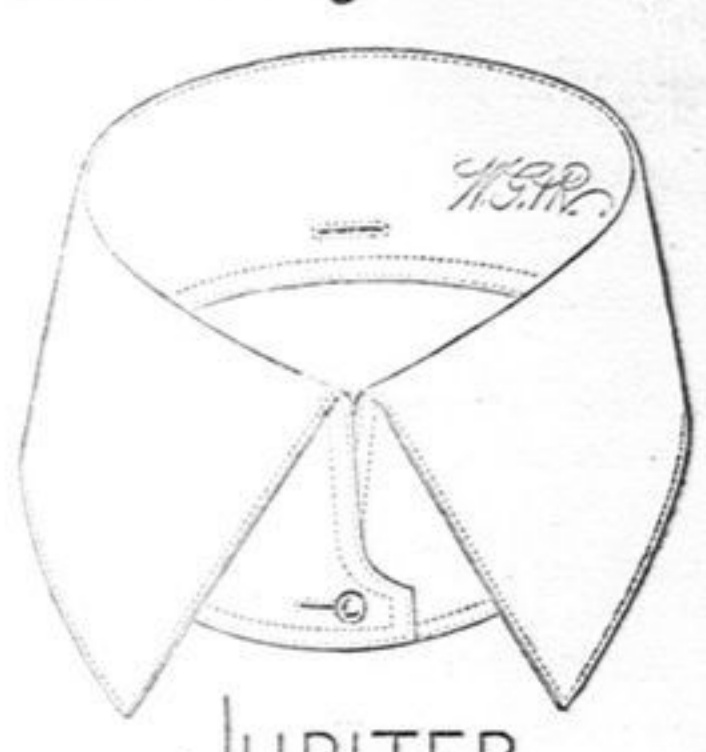

OUR CITY FATHERS.

A SHORT SESSION OF COUNCIL
MONDAY EVENING.

The Peuchin Bonus Under Discon-
tinuation and Report.

A brief session of the town council was
held Monday evening in the smoky and ill-
ventilated chamber set apart for the meet-
ings of that august body.

The members present were Mayor Smyth,
Reeve Ray, Dep. reeve Keith and Town-
shen, and Councillors Brady, Thurston, Pedlar,
Southern, Jas. Graham, Gilgill, Curtin
and Kilbray.

The minutes of the last regular and
special meetings were read by the clerk
and on motion were confirmed.

From R. Kerry, stating that he was out
of work, and asking for employment.—Re-
ferred to town property.

From F. Penrose, stating that he had
delivered 2,000 ft. of cedar on the
market square before tenders were called
for, and asking the town to purchase same,
subject to calling.—Referred to street
and bridge committee, with power to act.

From T. M. Finagan, city clerk of King-
ston, asking council to co-operate in
petitioning the legislature to amend the
law so that actions for damages against
corporations shall be tried by the county
judges without a jury.—Laid on table.

From the Mail and Empire advertising
agency, asking a grant for the purpose of
publishing Toronto 12:30 noon on same date.
centre letters the public.—Laid on table.

Accounts were read as follows: Bill
Telephone Co., \$10; Joe Staples, charity,
\$1.52.—Finished.

THE PEUCHIN BONUS.
A letter was read from Mr. A. G. Peuchin,
addressed to Mayor Smyth, acknowl-
edging receipt of letter asking him to
bring forward the bonus bill at a
public meeting in Lindsay. Mr. Peuchin
said he would prefer not to be called
upon at Lindsay on the 21st, but was
not a public speaker. If the dates men-
tioned were not suitable he might manage
to bring forward the bill at a public meet-
ing on the 21st.

It was pointed out that the first dates
would conflict with the curiers' excursion,
when many of the leading citizens would
be in Toronto.

Dep. reeve TOUCHBUEN said he did not
know whether it would be well to call a
public meeting or not—he felt positive
that the business of the town was not
an sufficient opposition would develop
to kill it and the money would be wasted.

Coun. SOUTHERN thought a public
meeting should be called to discuss the
matter, and the people regarding the
proposition made, and Mr. Peuchin
should be here to answer questions.

Coun. TOUCHBUEN said that before the
public meeting was called the council
should know whether the company intend-
ing to make the bonus a success or not.
If they went outside there would be little
value in talking about a bonus of any amount.

Dep. reeve KEITH was of opinion that a
meeting should be called to discuss the
matter, and the people regarding the
proposition made, and Mr. Peuchin
should be here to answer questions.

Coun. JAS. GRAHAM said it was pretty
well understood when Mr. Peuchin was
here that the town would be unable to
pay the bonus unless the town could
with an arrangement with Ops and the
G. T. R. the town would be able to offer ad-
vantages equivalent to such a bonus. If
the bonus was not paid, the town would
secure the industry than by giving \$5,000
in cash the lookout was a poor one, but if
the bonus was paid the town would gain
the advantages mentioned it would
be worth while making the effort. It had
been said by some business men that the
bonus would do nothing but to break up
the town, and that any money spent by
the council in developing the scheme would
be thrown away.

Coun. TOUCHBUEN said Mr. Peuchin to deposit
the sum of \$100 to pay the town's costs in case
the scheme fell through.

Dep. reeve KEITH suggested writing
Mr. Peuchin to the effect that the
council would do all in its power to assist
the company without appealing for special
grants to the legislature. The company
usually attend public meetings and are
responsible citizens, and little good would
result from that venture. If the council
grants the approval of holding a public
lot and secured the railway siding the
syndicate should be satisfied.

Coun. JAS. GRAHAM said they could not
grant the bonus until the consent of
the township council, as they had a
quarter interest in it.

Coun. TOUCHBUEN said he had written the
G. T. R. Co. with reference to the clerk,
and the reply was read by the clerk.
Mayor Smyth thought it would be well to
notify Mr. Peuchin that the council would
could offer, and if the company wanted a
special act the council would apply for it
at the company's expense.

Coun. GRAHAM said, in his opinion,
it is not the intention of the council to
consider a cash bonus. There is a great
divergence of opinion among the people regard-
ing the scheme, and it is not the intention
of the council to do so.

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the ray suggested. Referring to a special
case brought against the city of Toronto
by the pedlars who had been forbidden to
operate in a certain portion of the city,
Coun. GRAHAM stated that the pedlars
had been condemned to pay a large bill of
costs, and under the circumstances he
could not advise the passing of the proposi-
tion.

Mayor SMYTH remarked that it was a
nice question to decide whether they
could prevent a doer or at least during
the winter months.

The report was on motion adopted.

REPORT OF THE STREET AND BRIDGE COM-
MITTEE.
Dep. reeve TOUCHBUEN presented a brief
report endorsing the action of the
planning Co. Brooks in charge of the
road work, he received the balance
of the contract money.

Dep. reeve TOUCHBUEN said that perhaps
a short explanation would be advisable.
Mr. Touchbull had put it very strong in
saying that he had seen several dead
men, and for the benefit of members of the
council not on the committee he would give
facts. He (Touchbull) was responsible for
the road work done at Lindsay during a
recent heavy snow-storm he had waded
through the deep snow, as other citizens
and school children had to do, and had
seen Touchbull at his home smug and dry.
He then told him (Touchbull) that he had
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
